Paul S. Elliott Wins First Honors
for Junior Class with Grade
of 86

In the annual general information test of Pacific College held at the chapel hour Tuesday, March 30th, Paul S. Elliott won first honors for the Junior class with a grade of 86. For a number of years it has been customary to give an examination each year covering points of general information. It is significant that the average grades follow roughly the rank of the students in college.

This year the boys have a higher average than the girls, not only in the totals for the school but in all the classes with the exception of the first year academy.

The examination is given as a surprise test, the students being allowed one fifty minute period in addition to the chapel hour in which to write. The results which have just been announced are as follows:

THE INTERCHURCH CONVENTION

As scheduled the convention for Yamhill county was held in sections to make the best possible use of the team in the field and to accommodate the different districts in the county.

On the evening of the 12th the team was at Carlton and simultaneously on the 13th meetings were held at McMinnville and Newberg. In the afternoon Mr. Day made a comprehensive statement as to the Interchurch Movement. This was followed by an excellent address by Miss Capper, of Milwaukee, upon the subject of "Enlistment for Life Service."

She gave a most realistic portrayal of the present day needs of the world and its opportunities for helpfulness through the gospel as she took her audience to five mountain peaks of vision for world outlooks, viz. Africa, India, China, Japan and Latin America. She presented the religious and social problems of these countries in a very effective manner. She was followed by Mr. Austen, of Portland, who spoke of the need of spiritual evangelism for the world and of the program to be carried out by the Interchurch Movement.

The evening service was given to an instructive and entertaining stereoscopic presentation of the moral and social and industrial conditions of the world, the methods heretofore in vogue for supplying the needs of these departments of life and suggestions as to improvement upon them.

As a whole, the convention tended to bring before the people the needs of the entire world incident to the reconstruction following the war in which imperialism has been overthrown and social and religious conditions disturbed and incomprehensible burdens laid upon the people in the name of war debts. The church of Christ must hereafter assume larger obligations.

COMMERCIAL CLUB BANQUET GIVEN

Sixty People Partake of Big Feed
at Imperial Hotel Dining
Rooms

On Friday evening of last week the Commercial Club gave a banquet at one dollar per, there being about sixty in attendance.

At the close of the spread, John Larkin, P. M., acted as toastmaster, announcing the following program: Good Roads—S. M. Calkins, Ex-County Commissioner.

Paved Streets a Necessity—Mayor George Larkin.

Selection by Klenle's Orchestra. Motorboat Regatta Remarks and appointing of Committees—George Kelly, President Newberg Commercial Club.

Solo, Selected—Wm. Y. Arthur. Why Newberg Should Have a Community Legion Building—R. J. Moore.

A Beautiful City Park an Asset—Clarence Butt.

Selection by Klenle's Orchestra. Necessary Characteristics of a City—E. D. Timms, of Portland Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Calkins said in the course of his remarks that good market roads would mean more to Newberg just now than almost anything else and urged that this matter be given immediate attention. Said the voting of the bonds as outlined by the county court would make the carrying out of such a plan possible. He also spoke of two proposed new roads, first the Oakley road over Chehalis Mountain and second, the newly surveyed road over Parrett Mountain, both of which, he said, would greatly benefit, not only the communities through which they would pass, but Newberg as well.

Mayor Larkin, in his talk, made a comprehensive comparison between graveled streets and hardsurfacing and urged the necessity of the latter as outlined in the peresent paving plan made by the city council.

R. J. Moore spoke for the community building plan as proposed by the local American Legion, urging the necessity for a swimming tank, especially, where boys and girls could be taught to swim, and said also that money invested in a community building erected in honor of the American soldiers who participated in the European war would be well spent.

Attorney Clarence Butt took the place on the program that was to have been filled by S. S. Dow, of McMinnville, who was not present. Mr. Butt enlarged on the importance of spending time and money in providing Newberg with better park facilities and said the proposed site in the canyon below the new concrete bridge was an ideal spot for such expenditure.

C. C. Murton followed with a few remarks in which he said the site spoken of had very much greater natural advantages than did the park at McMinnville when it was first selected, and which is now the pride of the county seat city.

John Larkin, in speaking for a committee composed of himself and G. W. James which had been appointed to look up grounds, reported that in addition to the tract immediately below the bridge, an option had been taken on 21 lots adjoining on the south, which, if added, would make about eight acres in all that was well located for park purposes. He said further that a bonding proposition for \$10,000 for park purposes would probably be put up to the voters at the next city election.

Klenle's orchestra furnished excellent music for the evening, and W. Y. Arthur, vocalist, was so well received that he was called back for a second number.
