A visit to the place today discloses a new shipment of granite which has arrived, and the display equals and eclipses many of the Portland marble works. Mr. Lewis is equipped to turn out monuments which are works of art, and his workmen can hold their own with any of the marble cutters of the Northwest. He keeps two men at work with his power machines and the place is a busy one. The industry is growing each year, and is a credit to the county.
