The annual school picnic, Dundee's one great holiday, was the usual cloudy day with snatches of sun shine and tiny sprinkles of rain. But the weather never makes any difference with Dundeeites when it is school picnic day. As usual nearly everyone turned out and enjoyed the day with the happy children. In the forenoon an interesting program was given by the various classes. A song by Prof. Powell's singing class, oration, "Some Duties of a Good Citizen," by Ruth Bennett; a folk dance and drill by Miss Baker's class; hoop drill by Miss Martin's class; song and winding of the May pole by Mrs. Parrett's girls of the eighth grade; and a recitation, "Elf Man," by little Johnnie Eddens, constituted the program. At noon a cafeteria lunch was served in one of the unoccupied rooms. The usual races and contests of various kinds was the first part of the afternoon program, followed by a short informal talk by Co. Supt. S. S. Duncan. His theme was "Community Spirit," giving a broader interpretation to the meaning than is usually used. He commended the people of Dundee for their interest one with another and predicted a more satisfying growth in mental and spiritual things, as well as in the material, when all the people of our land regard themselves in each locality as one family. He emphasized the need of recreation and play for adults and contrasted the limited ideas along that line of a few years ago with the more enlightened views of the present day. After Mr. Duncan's speech a ball game finished the day's program. On Thursday evening the gradu-

ating exercises of the Dundee high school were held in Community Hall. Owing to the many changes in the past few years we had but two graduates this year, Miss Eunice Homm and Fred Hutchinson. The stage was tastefully decorated in the class colors, pink and green, and the class motto, "Pluck Wins," was displayed in pink letters on a background of green ferns. The invocation was given by Rev. J. H. Gil-

lepie, followed by remarks by the school principal, Prof. Dempster. Miss Homm read an essay, "True Education," in which she told of the many elements besides books that go toward making an educated person. Fred Hutchinson followed with an oration on "Politics." Fred interpreted politics in its large way and showed by his handling of the subject that he is training himself to be a reading, thinking citizen of this great Republic. Fred has a decided gift for oratory and his friendly spirit makes him one of the favorites among the young men of Dundee. The president of the school board, W. J. Bennett, presented the diplomas to the high school graduates with a few fitting remarks, and Supt. Duncan delivered the eighth grade diplomas with a short speech to the following graduates: Ruth Bennett, Selma Wolaki, Hazel Anderson, Constance Stevens, Hermina Frankhouser, Grace Johnson, May Groth, Stanley Warren and Alfred Nelderberger. During the evening Mrs. Flagen, of Salem, favored the audience with vocal music. Mrs. Flagen has a very pleasing voice and her contribution to the evening's program was greatly enjoyed. Uel Marr was her accompanist.

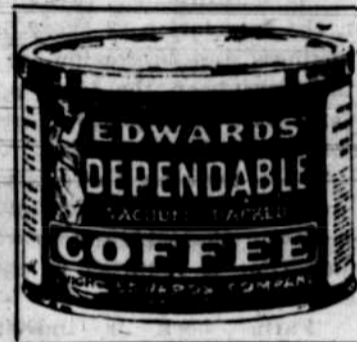
GOING SOME ON MOTOR DRIVEN CARS
