### SUIT IS STARTED OVER RESULT OF ELECTION

John U. Smith et al. vs. C. E. Daniels et al. is the title of a recent suit filed in the circuit court for Yamhill county through Frank Holmes and Chas. Anderson, their attorneys, against the county judge and commissioners and county clerk and nine private parties to obtain a recount on a measure voted on at the recent election.

The plaintiffs pray an order requiring the defendants and C. B. Wilson as county clerk, to produce the ballots voted for and against said measure and that court cause the vote to be canvassed and an order declaring the result of said election on the measure and that the votes of Henry Clay Wright, Byron McKelvy, Minnie V. Cooper, Fred D. Frost, Nate L. Wiley, Clara M. Moore, Lucinda Putman, Asa Butler and Albert G. Dill will be declared illegal and not counted and that the plaintiff have such other and further relief as may seem equitable in the premises.

The plaintiffs are John U. Smith, George Foster and L. L. Thornton.

The suit is instituted to affect the result of the election on the Four-Road project. The defendants it is alleged, Wright, Kelvy, Cooper, et al, voted against the measure. It is further alleged that they were not registered voters.

It is alleged that the county judge was not present at the time of the canvass made by County Clerk Wilson and two other persons.

Chapter 103, General Laws of Oregon, 1919, it is alleged, contains no provisions to determine the vote on an initiative measure and the plaintiffs have no plain remedy at law.

It is also alleged that the county court did not make the proper order declaring the result on the measure in question.

The measure in litigation is one of the road bond measures which designated four different road projects for improvement on a 50-50 basis.—News Reporter.

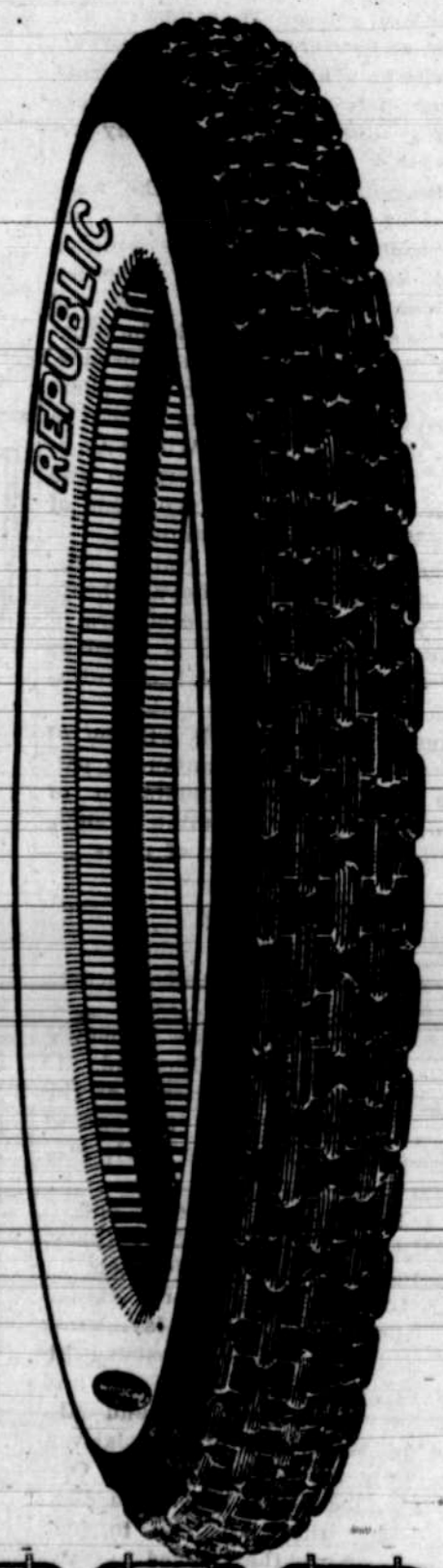
