WHY GOLD COINS ARE BEST

The peculiarity of gold which makes it valuable is its hardness and its wearing properties. Gold coin loses one-hundredth part only of its weight in 50 years, while silver loses as much in 10 years. Again, gold is discolored by scarcely anything with which it can come in contact. It is hardly affected by exposure to the air and it is unaltered by strongest acids.

A third peculiarity of gold is the fact that it can be beaten or rolled into thin sheets. By a rolling mill it can be beaten out thinner than any other metal, and to such an extent that leaves of gold laid upon one another to the number of 300,000 only measure one inch thick. Again, one grain can be drawn out into 500 feet of wire.

We talk of things being as heavy as lead, but gold is nearly twice as heavy, though few people have had the chance of holding much gold in their hands as lead and so comparing them. And they will have less chance still in the future, for gold will be scarce for many years to come.

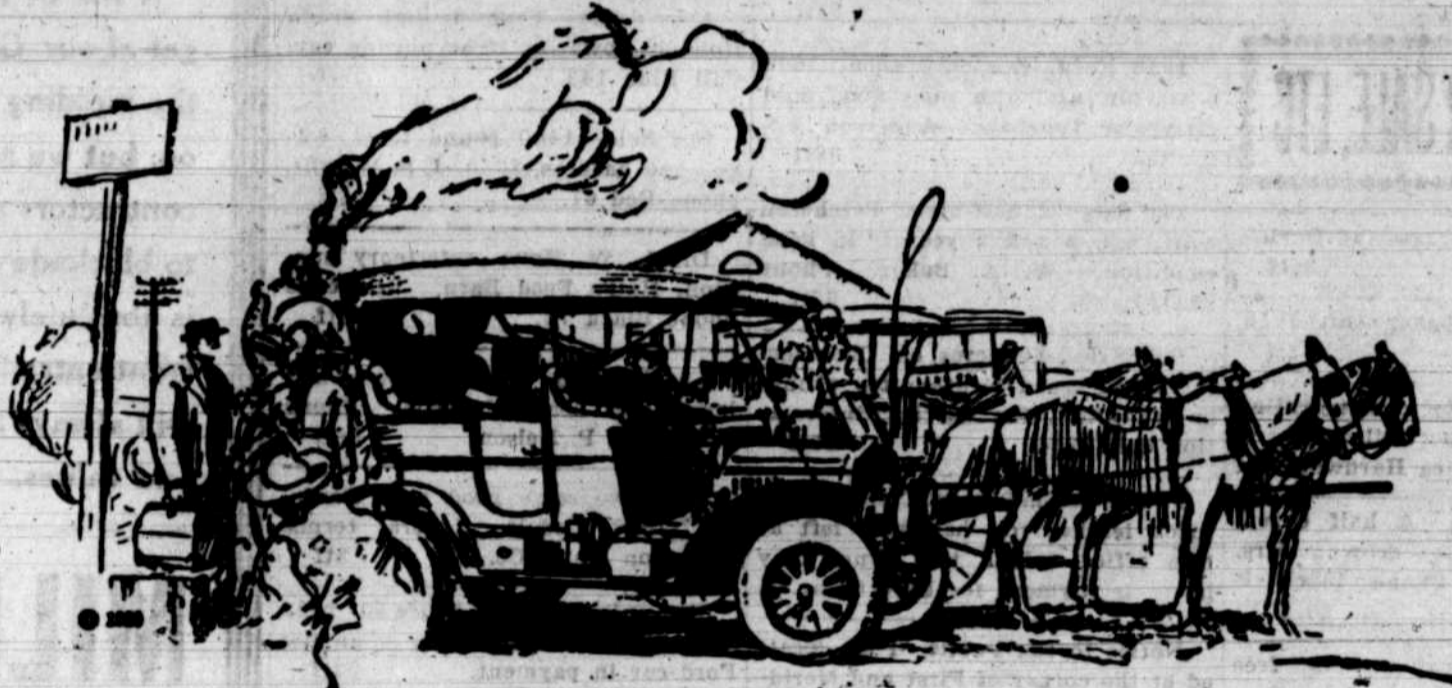
