

HOUSE FAMINE

Real estate men in this city are besieged with inquiries for houses for rent and there are none to be had. It is doubtful if there are more than three or four vacant houses in the city and these are for sale but not for rent. Real estate men say they could place 500 people in this town inside of the next 60 days if they could get the houses. This looks like a good opportunity for the investment of capital as there are plenty of vacant lots on which to build and a five room house in a good location would rent for easily \$25.00 per month. There have been offers of \$30.00 per month for a six room house with a guarantee the renter could stay six months. As one renter explained, it was not a question of how much rent the property owner wanted, but how long could he keep the house. Many of the owners are selling when offered a little profit and for this reason keep the renter in a state of uneasiness as he knows not how soon he may have to move. However, this scarcity of houses is not only local, but extends over the entire country from the Pacific to the Atlantic and from the Canadian line to the Gulf, and it will require at least ten years to catch up with the demand.

THE PACIFIC HIGHWAY.

The citizens of Yamhill county, who by a large majority voted for the issuance of bonds to build the Pacific Highway, are wondering why the Highway Commission is halting on the job. Is it because bonds command a low price on the market? If so the reason is insufficient, as it is well known that bonds were low when the voters by a 3 to 1 majority voted for the bonds. They were told before they voted, that if the measure carried the work would be put through rapidly, and now since the voters have practically ordered the road built, they ask that the Commission carry out their pre-election promises and close up the gaps. If the Pacific railroad can borrow money at 8 per cent to make improvements along the line, the State of Oregon can pay 5 or 5 1/2 per cent for money to complete the Pacific Highway. The voters of Yamhill county want the Highway and they want it now. They pay the taxes and they want to enjoy the use of the highway now, and not leave that part altogether to another generation. If the Highway Commission is desirous of doing its duty toward the voters and hopes to hear them say, "well done thy good and faithful servants," the Commission will at once get busy and let the voters know that their wishes have been considered and that their will shall be a law unto the Highway Commission.
