

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING.

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Eastman, of this city narrowly escaped drowning in the Willamette river at Fernwood one evening the latter part of last week. Mrs. Eastman, who is unable to swim, got into deep water and called for help, which quickly brought Mr. Eastman to her assistance but Mrs. Eastman very naturally being excited and frightened seized upon her husband in such a manner as to frustrate his efforts at rescue, and both went down in deep water and would undoubtedly have been drowned but for the timely succor rendered by Mr. C. R. Duer, and Miss Obi Natwick, both good swimmers, who very fortunately were near at hand and hastened to the aid of the Eastmans, whom they succeeded in saving. Mr. Duer expressed the opinion that without the assistance of Miss Natwick, he would not have been able to save Mr. and Mrs. Eastman from drowning.

P. O. EMPLOYEES NOT TO MIX IN POLITICS

Postmaster General Burleson, has recently issued an order forbidding employees in the postal service from participating in politics.

The order reads as follows: "Employees are accountable for political activity by persons other than themselves, including wives and husbands."
