THE FARMERS' ORGANIZATION.

Readers of the Graphic:

With the permission of the editor I wish to say a few words relative to the call in the Graphic last week for a meeting at the high school building September 11, to organize a Farmers' Club. If you did not see that notice, look it up.

I don't know the promoter personally, in fact never talked with him but a minute or so over the phone, offering my support to the movement, and don't know the motive back of it, but, farmers, here is a chance that we can't afford to pass up. Here is man who is willing and anxious to aid us as is shown by his remarks in the Graphic the past year. If he has any "ax to grind" it is not apparent to me. However if he has, a farmers' club would be under the control of its members so he would not be in position to do us any harm.

But it seems that here is the advantage of a County Agent without any extra taxes. As he is a representative not only of the State of Oregon but also of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in one way, he has at his command all the latest and best information available on agricultural matters. It is to be regretted that some interests blocked the efforts to retain a County Agent in this, one of the most fertile and populous of the counties of the state, but now we are offered not only a substitute but what should be locally, at least, a better proposition.

We have, adjacent to Newberg thousands of acres of the most fertile land in the West, if not in the world. Its productiveness is limited only by the care it is given. Practically every acre of it is capable of supporting in luxury one or more persons. It does not do it now. Why? Inefficiency somewhere. How can this be overcome? Here is where a Farmers' Club, under the guidance of a trained leader is of incalculable value. To the farmer, production and marketing are the leading questions. Both of these can be improved by organization, co-operation, etc. You remember the patriot who said "If we don't all hang together we will all hang separately." We have been hanging separately for many years, now let us try hanging together. This is not a slap at the town or any individual in it. They are not entirely to blame, but they are links in a faulty chain. They are a necessary evil under the present system which can and should be changed, and the farmers have it in their power to change it to a large extent. To do it we must get together and work together. We need the town, and it needs us. We farmers must get together and discuss our problems, work in unit, and be in position to dictate to the other fellow a part of the time at least. Individually we are at the mercy of practically the whole world as we are the only class that is unorganized.

Organization is of great assistance in the matter of production as well as in marketing our products. Do you know what crops are best adapted to your soil, what stock is most profitable, how and when to fertilize to best advantage, how

to prune, spray, cultivate, and many other operations, properly? Do your various kinds of stock make you a profit? If not, why not? We have among us men who have made a specialty of these different questions, and who are glad to give others the benefit of their experience, but to do this to advantage we must get together occasionally and give them a chance. A few demonstration trips would be of immense value especially to newcomers and beginners. These are just a few suggestions of the possibilities of a farmers' organization.

Now, brother Kilham, if I have interfered with your program I am ready to apologize, and will be glad to boost any other plans you may have to benefit the farmer.

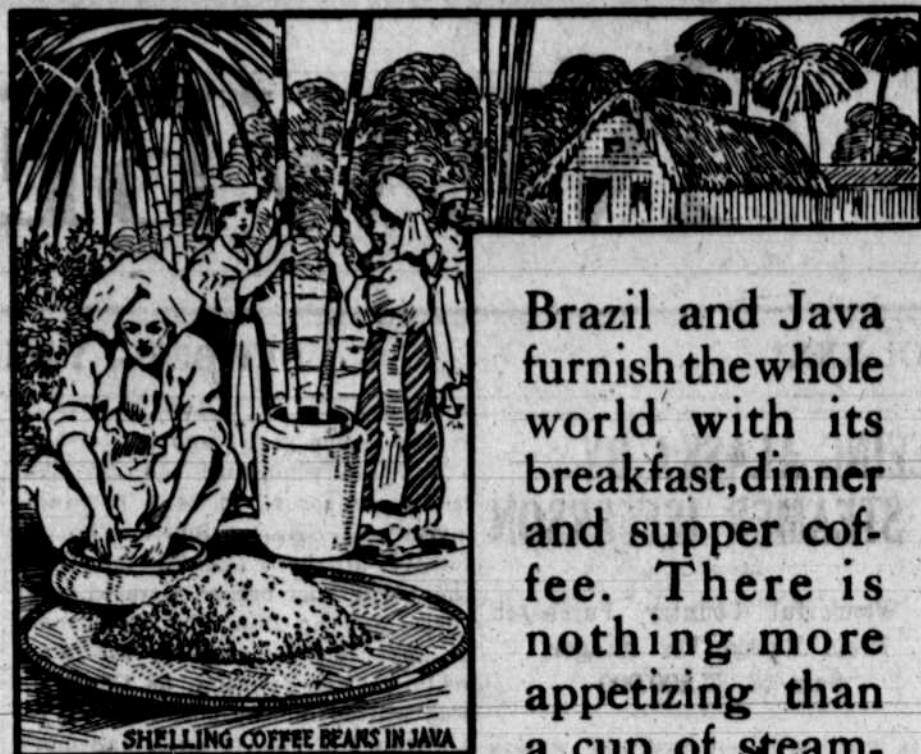
