Horace Sykes, secretary for the State Fire Marshal, has made a survey of conditions in Newberg and in his report has made some recommendations for increasing the efficiency of our firefighting apparatus, which includes the purchase of a one-ton fire truck with chemical tanks and hose. His recommendations will be published in full next week.

A number of Newberg people went to Portland last Monday to hear Cox speak at the auditorium, and the report they brought back is that he is an able political campaigner who knows how to play upon words to make a hit with an audience. Nobody, however, has been heard to make a claim at any time for Cox carrying Oregon, and since the Maine election returns have come in, his most ardent followers must begin to have grave doubts about his being able to make much of a showing in the final count.

The heavy rains of the first of the week caused a good deal of concern among prune growers who feared material damage might result from the cracking of fruit, but so far as the Graphic has been able to learn the damage has not amounted to a great deal. W. S. Allan, of Dundee, figures it not to exceed one per cent of cracked prunes. The crop is a good one and if weather conditions prove to be good for the next few

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weeks all will be well with growers so far as caring for the crop goes. The matter of prices for green and dried prunes are yet to be determined, as buyers are slow in showing a hand, since there is reported to be considerable of the stock of last year still unsold.

The announcement of the pardon granted by Governor Olcott to young Branson, who was serving a term in the penitentiary for the murder of Booth at Willamina, came as a surprise to many people of Yamhill county. So far as the Graphic has heard people express themselves regarding this case the sentiment has been, and still is, that both Mrs. Booth and young Branson had a hand in the murder of Booth, and further that both of them should have been

allowed to remain to serve time. Attorney Roswell Conner, who prosecuted them at the trial, was in Newberg the first of the week and he said that he was fully convinced that Branson fired the shot that killed Booth, and consequently he had always held out against a pardon being granted him. It is rather an unusual procedure for a governor to grant a pardon without the consent of the prosecuting attorney who handled the case, and in the eyes of many people, Governor Olcott made a serious mistake in this case.

A news note from Oregon City says Rev. H. G. Crocker has purchased a truck and that he will give his personal attention to gathering and placing his Newberg prune crop on the market.

Wilma Evans, and Thelma Stults.

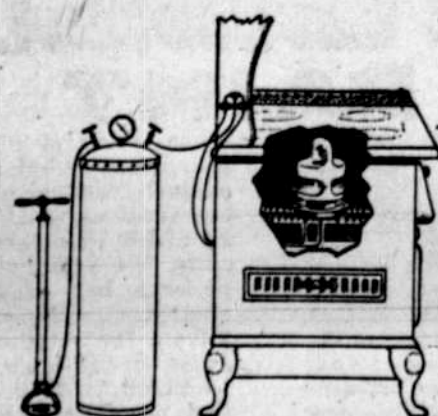
