The broad arrow is the mark cut or stamped on all British government stores to distinguish them as public or crown property, and to obliterate or deface which is a felony. Persons in possession of goods marked with the broad arrow forfeit the goods and are subject to a penalty. The broad arrow was the cognizance of Henry, viscount of Sydney, earl of Romney, master general of ordnance, 1693-1702, and was at first placed only on military stores. It is also the mark used in the British ordnance survey to denote points from which measurements have been made.
