The railroads appear to be playing fair with the two leading candidates for the presidency, since both Mr. Cox and Mr. Harding have been given a shaking up by wrecks.

A few years ago practically all the straw in the valley was baled for market but now there is little baling being done. As a result the retail price is a dollar a hundred which makes a straw bed come a bit high.

There will be eight councilmen to elect at the city election which will be held at the same time of the presidential election, and if the interests of Newberg are to be looked after as they should be eight busy people must be found who will make sacrifices of time and effort in thus serving the people.

As will be found noted elsewhere a large family was made destitute of clothing and household effects by a fire that occurred at Rex Tuesday afternoon. Here is an opportunity for some one out that way to answer the Scriptural question, "Who is my neighbor?" by getting out with a subscription paper and raising funds for meeting the present needs of the unfortunate family.

The various churches of Newberg and adjacent territory are urged to take up the matter of collecting clothing and bedding for the Armenian sufferers. Almost any family can easily spare something that will aid in making up a substantial shipment. Mrs. Sadie Stewart and Mrs. W. H. Woodworth have the matter in hand and they will receive stuff up to Wednesday of next week. If all will help a little a splendid showing may be made which will doubtless prevent some one from freezing to death the coming winter. Promptness and liberal giving will greatly aid the committee.

Prune growers in the Willamette valley have never before seen a more unfavorable season for caring for the crop than this has been. During the past week the sun has shined and made it possible to do more satisfactory work, but the damage done by the continuous rains of last week has been enormous. In some orchards the loss has been fifty per cent, or more, and it has been practically impossible to put out any really first class fruit. The work is about over in the lower land orchards, but on the higher land another week will be required, and possibly a longer time, provided the weather remains fair. Should more rain come now there would not be much fruit left that would be worth saving.

Tally one for Governor Olcott. He is said to be cleaning house at the State Fair grounds and weeding out amusements of a questionable character. Last year many concessions were allowed on the grounds that were a disgrace to the management and to the state. The people of Oregon are taxed to meet the expenses of the fair and there is no occasion for licensing gamblers for the poor excuse of raising revenue. One of the sorry features in connection with an investigation that was made by the fair board some time after the close of the fair last year, was the report made by a prominent Corvallis minister, well known throughout Oregon, who said he looked through the amusement section on the grounds and found nothing to condemn. Newberg men who attended the fair and who know what gambling is, said there were gambling joints running at every turn, almost. None are so blind as those who will not see.

ABOUT OREGON INDUSTRIES

Astoria

Derrick timbers are in place and foundations have been completed for the derrick to be erected for the Columbia Oil and Gas Company's well on the Chew farm near Warrenton. Drilling equipment will be brought here shortly.

Cement blocks are soon to be turned out here by a new factory in charge of Victor Lindberg, who now has machinery for his plant on the way from the east. He later plans to add tile to his output.

Picking of cranberries in Clatsop county has been started with about 150 people at work. The yield will be 25 per cent heavier than last year and with that of Pacific county, Washington, is expected to be sufficient to supply the trade for the two states and California.

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Salem

Establishment of a Holland bulb farm near Salem, which will supply florists in every section of the United States with hyacinths, tulips, narcissus, daffodils, gladiolus and other bulbs by wholesale is to open next week near here.

Baker

Preparations are being made to electrify the mill of the Queen mine company at Cornucopia in order that it may operate all winter. The line is to connect with the Idaho Power company's wires.

Plans are being made for the rebuilding of the Hess sawmill, recently destroyed by fire near North Powder. The capacity of the plant will be largely increased.

Tillamook

Figures prepared on cheese production in this section show that the industry earned over \$260 per capita for every man, woman and child in the county. More than \$2,000,000 worth was turned out.

Portland

Handling waste paper will form the principal business of the Independent Paper Company of San Francisco, which is erecting a group of buildings in this city. The main structure, of brick, will be 80x100 feet. There will be sorting and receiving sheds, the three costing \$35,000 for their erection.

To the increasing number of steamship lines touching here regularly will soon be added the vessels of the United American Lines, Incorporated, of New York city. These steamers will carry freight between the east and west coasts of the United States and services will be inaugurated with the sailing of the Hawaiian by way of the Panama canal on October 2.

Advertisements for the promotion of Oregon payrolls are to be included in a campaign of publicity being conducted by the Ladd & Tilton bank. Each advertisement discusses a particular Oregon industry, telling the name of each brand of that product made in Oregon, and advising consumers to buy Oregon-made.

A large foreign order for oleomargarine had to be turned down recently because the only oleomargarine factory in the Northwest, because Oregon law prohibits the use of vegetable coloring in the product. The foreign buyer had insisted that the product be colored and plainly labeled "oleomargarine." The order, which would have been worth thousands of dollars to Oregon, went to Omaha. The board of directors of the Associated Industries have voted unanimously to fight the oleomargarine bill, maintaining that it interferes with both the industries and the rights of consumers.
