THE HIGH SCHOOL AGRICULTURE NOTES

Wednesday, October 13, the class in Farm Animals visited Greenbriar farm, on the Portland road, Isaac Hunt, proprietor. The farm was inspected generally, but special note was made of the dairy facilities. Two fine animals, a cow and bull, both registered Jerseys, were inspected. The class was informed that seven other fine cows had been sold because of inability to get efficient help.

Thursday afternoon, October 14, the Horticulture class visited the local A. Rupert Co. Inc. cannery. The majority of the members of the class knew little about a cannery and its workings, so were greatly interested.

Quinces and prunes were handled in the preparation-room, while in the jam-room opportunity was afforded for sampling the apricot preserves that were being made. The process of jar-filling, capping, etc., as well as labeling were going on, and many things were seen that were both interesting and instructive.

Such work should be of particular interest to Newberg young people, for there is an almost unlimited demand for capable scientifically trained cannery executives. O. A. C. gives, at Corvallis, the first and only college course in cannery practice in the country. The Sunday Oregonian carried an article about it. The chance for local observation and practise while studying in high school, topped by special study at O. A. C., offers most attractive vocational possibilities.

Friday, October 15, the class in Farm Field Crops visited the farm of C. W. Bradshaw, president of the Newberg Farmers' Club. The class certainly did spend a pleasant and profitable hour with Mr. Bradshaw.

Nearly everything tastable was tasted, including sorghum cane and Niagara grapes, not to mention apples, etc., etc.

Mr. Bradshaw was generosity itself, and we came home loaded down with all sorts of material for study.

We need the co-operation of every farmer in the vicinity, with a view to giving our agriculture students a right vocational perspective, and the greatest possible amount of good practical instruction.

If you have something—or are doing things—of which you are proud, we would like to know of it so we may have profit for our boys, and also for local grown-ups, for of course we shall gladly pass on the good things that will tend to help others.

Water Stored in Form of Ice. With the idea of getting away from the expensive construction of dams for the purpose of storing water, the suggestion has been made that the water be stored in winter in the shape of ice and allowed to melt as it may be desired in summer time. This would insure water in sufficient quantities for small irrigation systems at least and certainly would cut down the expense of storing. In addition to this it would afford work for a certain class of labor which usually is not occupied at this season of the year.
