Social Hygiene Meeting Announced For Next Monday Night.

The Oregon Social Hygiene Society is arranging for a meeting to be held in the American Legion Hall, of Newberg, on Monday, November 22, at 7:30 p. m. This meeting will be open to all men and is intended to provide information every man is anxious to possess regarding the facts of sex. Dr. Coleman, of Portland, will be assisted by local speakers.

The Oregon Social Hygiene Society is an organization of thoughtful, earnest business men, professional men, educators, clergymen, and others, associated together in an educational campaign to prevent the further spread of venereal disease, to remove misinformed teachings in a decent manner the laws of sex life and to improve the social and moral conditions of the people of the state, especially its youth.

The doing of these things is not a matter of a day or a year. It can be accomplished only by the persistent and combined effort of all the forces for uplift in each community and in the state at large.

The Society has practically driven certain forms of medical advertisements out of the state and has made very difficult the activities of quack specialists. At the same time it has carried on a definite program of education designed to arouse parents and all concerned to the seriousness of the situation. Its work is constructive and educational.

While the Society is financed entirely by state appropriation its activities are directed by a group of prominent business and professional men of Portland and the state at large. MISSIONARY ADDRESS GIVEN AT WEST CHEHALEM CHURCH

He will complete his journey around the world next spring by going to San Francisco, but will be in Portland and vicinity for the winter.

SAVE PRUNE TREES FROM BORERS

During the past season the writer has heard a number of prune growers in the vicinity of Newberg complain of their trees being damaged by the borer, and all agreed that the most effective method of fighting this destructive pest, was to remove the soil around the base of the tree and dig the grubs out of their galleries with a sharp pointed knife.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture experts believe that a practical means of ridding orchards of these pests has been found in what is called the para-dichlorobenzene treatment, which was first used extensively by orchardists in 1919. It consists of sprinkling fine crystals of the insecticide on the soil around the base of the infected tree and covering with earth to hold the gas. The substance is highly volatile and forms gas when the soil is between 74 and 80 F. This gas is five times heavier than air and sinks down through the soil and is highly effective against the borer. A pound of the insecticide costing not more than 25 cents is sufficient for 8 or 10 trees.

The labor required is not one third of that of the former methods, consequently there is a great saving of time.

The present year, this treatment was used successfully in the Georgia peach belt, some localities buying as much as 50,000 pounds, and large individual owners as much as two tons each.

Growers declare that it is one of the greatest accomplishments in the history of the department, comparable to the self-boiled lime-sulphur treatment for control of brown rot and scab of the peach. As the treatment now has the unqualified endorsement of the Agricultural Department, and is beyond the experimental stage, it would undoubtedly be advisable for the orchardists of this part of the country to avail themselves of this new and successful treatment for the borer and save their fine orchards.

It has been estimated that borers do \$6,000,000 damage annually, and that \$2,000,000 annually have been expended in fighting them.

PRUNES GOWING SLOW

The prune market is sized up by R. C. Paulus, sales manager of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association as follows:

In view of the downward revision of all commodities, the Oregon Growers had named a price on prunes at which it was thought the crop would move, and on a basis where it was probable there would be a slight advance.

The association's price was named with the knowledge that it is always better to sell on a rising market, as this insures acceptance of contracts, rather than on a falling market which often brings rejections and cancellations.

The two declines in prune prices early in the season of half a cent each alarmed buyers. Then another decline of from one to two cents rather confirmed foreign and eastern buyers in the opinion that the bottom had not been reached.

At present, buying interest is very low, although sales representatives of the Oregon Growers report increasing scarcity of stock in the market and predict better conditions.

CLUB BANQUET TUESDAY NIGHT

Bert Miller, Standard Oil Magnate, Is Master of Ceremonies.

The dining room at the Imperial was filled to capacity Tuesday night at the Commercial Club banquet which was presided over by Bert Miller as toastmaster.

Following the spread and under cover of a deep cloud of tobacco smoke, Messrs. Aye, Faville and Everson representing the state Chamber of Commerce, occupied nearly an hour in telling of the work the state association is doing in the way of advertising Oregon and in finding the localities throughout the state that are suited to the requirements of prospective investors.

Thirty-five thousand dollars is the sum being asked for in a state-wide campaign that is being made for funds to be used in advertising the resources of Oregon and in carrying out the work of the chamber, and the allotment for Newberg is \$1,400. The benefits that have been realized by California in catering to the tourist trade were emphasized, and the necessity for Oregon doing more in preparing to welcome tourists was enlarged upon.

Mrs. Lottie Hannon of our home community and well known W. C. T. U. lecturer, and Mrs. Mary Russell, of Portland, were given an opportunity to speak for the proposed orphan's home, a fund for the establishing which is being raised under the direction of the state W. C. T. U., aided by a number of well known business men throughout the state. The sum proposed is \$150,000 and the ladies stated that the proposition is being received with such hearty response that they feel that the establishing of the home is already assured. They said further that the location had not been decided on and they made a plea for Yamhill county, with the further suggestion that a location on the highway near Newberg would be ideal. Mrs. Hannon is very enthusiastic over the proposition and believes that it is worth while for Newberg to make a strong pull for getting the home located here.

Since the meeting held Tuesday night a canvass has been started for funds for the state Chamber of Commerce as above stated.

A number of pastors of Yamhill county met on Monday November 15, in the rooms of the Commercial Club at McMinnville and organized a county ministerial association. Rev. A. F. Lacy of Amity was elected chairman and Rev. E. M. Smith, of McMinnville, secretary. Among other things the new organization is to support the work of the county Young Men's Christian Associations in all of its county-wide activities.

BOY LOSES HAND BY DYNAMITE CAP

Six Year Old Son of Amos Morgan Badly Crippled By Explosion.

On last Saturday in the forenoon while Mr. and Mrs. Amos Morgan were away from their home on Chehalis Mountain, their little six-year-old son was very badly injured by the explosion of a dynamite cap with which he was playing.

Mr. Morgan had left for Newberg with a load of cream and Mrs. Morgan had gone to a neighbor, leaving the children at home. On finding a dynamite cap the little fellow held it in his left hand while he exploded it with a lighted match which he held in the other hand. A woman who was occupying a room on the second floor of the residence rushed down on hearing the explosion and gave first aid by stopping the flow of blood and putting the little fellow to bed. She also hurried the other children off for their mother, who when told of the accident, tried to reach her husband by phone but did not succeed until well along in the afternoon and it was about four o'clock before Dr. Hester, who was called, reached the home.

The left hand was torn entirely away and considerable injury was done about the face and eyes.

On Wednesday the little fellow was taken by Dr. Hester to Portland for the assistance of an eye specialist, with the hope of saving the eyes, which are said to be in a serious condition.

AUTOMOBILE DEATH TOLL

Newberg, Nov. 15.—Scott Allen, 20 years old and resident of Washington county for several years, was run down and killed today when caught between a truck and an automobile near here.

Eugene, Or., Nov. 15.—Mrs. Augusta Leader, 70, of this city, died Sunday afternoon a few hours after she had been run down by a car driven by Mrs. J. N. Crocker. The car passed over Mrs. Leader's body. Concussion of the brain resulted.

Mrs. Leader was about to cross the street when she saw a car coming rapidly toward her. She stepped back to the curb. Either being confused or unaccustomed to driving, Mrs. Crocker lost control of the machine and it plunged without letup upon Mrs. Leader. The victim was dragged several feet before the car was stopped.

Sheridan, Or. Nov. 15.—John T. Simpson, an attorney of Sheridan, and step-brother of Sam L. Simpson, the Oregon poet, met his death Sunday evening in Sheridan by being struck by an auto.

He was coming out of his office and had passed beside a load of hay standing on the street. A light auto, driven by McMillan Bros. of Willamina, was passing on the opposite side of the hay, and seeing Simpson, they swerved their car into the hay wagon, but Simpson jumped back in front of the machine and was thrown to the pavement and injured internally. He lived about one hour, retaining consciousness, and exonerating the driver from blame.

John T. Simpson had been a resident of the Sheridan section since the days of the famous Phil Sheridan. He was the son of Ben Simpson, former surveyor general and Indian agent, and had crossed the plains to Oregon in 1846. He taught school in Grand Ronde district in early days. Besides his wife he is survived by Mrs. E. R. Seely, daughter, whose husband is a Portland physician; Mrs. T. J. Scoggin of La Grande, daughter; Frank Simpson and John Simpson of Albany, and Carl Simpson of Portland, sons.

NEWBERG PEOPLE INJURED IN AUTO COLLISION TUES. NIGHT

Early Tuesday evening at a point on the highway near the Tualatin river, Walter S. Mills' car had a head-on collision with a Portland truck, resulting in the injury of the occupants of the auto and wrecking the car almost beyond repair.

Mr. and Mrs. Mills and daughter, George Crites and George Jones were returning from the Stock Show and were following another car, which checked up suddenly on meeting a truck with glaring head-lights.

In order to avoid hitting the car in front of him, Mr. Mills swerved to the left and was suddenly blinded by the glare of the lights on the truck, which he had not before seen, and the crash was on. Jones and Miss Mills were thrown out on the pavement, the latter without injury, but Mr. Jones received a very severe cut on the cheek and upper lip. Crites received a scalp wound and Mills was considerably bruised by being jammed against the steering gear, while Mrs. Mills escaped without any particular injury.

The parties say they consider themselves fortunate in escaping as well as they did, and they also say that had their car been going at any great speed they would most likely have all been killed.

A heavy rain was falling and it is said that there were as many as a half dozen more or less serious accidents of this kind on the road during that night.

BETTER FIRE PROTEC- TION ADVOCATED

Fire Fighting Experts Address Meeting At Club Rooms Wednesday Night.

The meeting at the Commercial Club rooms Wednesday night for the purpose of educating the public along the lines of fire protection, prevention, causes and effects, was well attended and proved highly interesting and instructive. Capt. George Stokes of the State Fire Marshal's office was the first speaker of the evening, and made a strong and convincing appeal for better fire protection for Newberg and showed clearly and convincingly the urgent need of the same, stating that the state department had sent a representative here sometime ago, who had reported a lack of necessary equipments at this place. He dwelt on the necessity of taking proper means of preventing fires, and strongly urged the purchase of modern equipment.

The next speaker, Thomas Graham, chief of the Corvallis fire department, said to be the best in Oregon, said that he had carefully looked over the conditions here, and found them about the same as confronted him when he took charge of the Corvallis department 12 years ago; the equipment was almost identical. The streets here are in bad condition for good fire service, there is not sufficient hose and what there is on hand is in bad condition, as is also the ladders. He showed clearly the inadequacy of the old equipment, and said if he was a business man here he would favor raising a jack pot and bringing the new equipment to Newberg at the earliest possible moment, as the danger of loss is so great that he would not feel that it would be good policy to wait for the election December 2, to ratify the proposed plan. He also spoke of the advisability of having a ladies auxiliary to the fire department and showed how they might be helpful.

Gilbert Allen of the State Fire Department, the next speaker, said that statistics prove that 65 per cent of the fires may be prevented by proper inspection, and declared that Newberg should have a Fire Chief at a Salary of \$100 a month to enable him to do the necessary inspection work. He said that new business enterprises and manufacturing establishments are afraid to locate in a town that can not give them adequate fire protection, no matter how many other inducements they might offer.

Fire Chief Ed. Crenwell, of the Portland department, gave an interesting talk and emphasized the necessity of rigid inspection as a means of prevention of fires, and urged the purchase of proper equipment.

Horace Sykes, Deputy State Fire Marshal presented a convincing array of statistics showing losses by fire in this country, where one life is lost every two hours throughout the year, and property losses are a million dollars a day. He also stated that three-fourths of all fires can be successfully combated by the use of chemicals.

The evening's entertainment was concluded with the display of a number of stereopticon views, illustrating frequent causes of fires and showing how they may be prevented or avoided. Great interest was manifested by the audience which was undoubtedly in full accord with the views of the distinguished fire fighters, who are thoroughly conversant with every detail pertaining to the business, and whose advice and counsel is worthy of careful consideration.
