Mr. and Mrs. Bixler said they had been considerably handicapped in the work, owing to the fact that so many growers, who were only experimenting this season, brought in very small lots of cane. The quality of the molasses is good, however, and it is apparent that there is nothing to prevent farmers here from growing the cane for the manufacture of all the sweets of this kind they may need for home consumption, and also for supplying the market. The mill for grinding the cane, which was made at the Newberg Iron Foundry, has been entirely satisfactory, and Mr. Hollenbeck and Mr. Bixler say they hope the farmers may grow sufficient cane next season to make it worth while.

SORGHUM MEETING HELD

A very interesting meeting was held by the Newberg Farmers club last Saturday, at the high school building. The subjects of cane raising and sorghum making were discussed quite thoroughly.

S. T. Bixler gave his experience in raising and manufacturing sorghum molasses in Oregon. He said three years ago he wrote to the experiment station in regard to raising cane in Oregon but was informed that it would not grow to any advantage here. However, he planted some seed brought from the middle west, and was rewarded by a fair crop.

The next year he planted seed from his own cane and produced a better grade of cane.

This year he again planted seed of his own raising and produced enough cane on one-half of an acre to make forty-five gallons of molasses.

He says the best variety for this locality is some early maturing kind and thinks the "Amber" will prove to be the proper one when acclimated to a better degree than at present.

There were some very fine samples of the molasses made this year, brought in by Mr. Bixler, that were enjoyed by those present. Some of the ladies told how and where sorghum could be made to take the place of sugar, and of course, several of the gentlemen told how good Grandma's ginger-cakes were, when they were boys.

Mr. Kilham gave a short talk giving the origin of the canes and the various divisions of the cane family. He also called attention to the danger of feeding stalks that had taken a second growth, or that had been stunted, to cattle. But if proper care is taken there is very little danger and they make an excellent feed.
