THINGS WISE AND OTHERWISE

LAND NOT HIGH

We have heard some expressions of opinion to the effect that land prices in this vicinity were too high. We are inclined to the belief that land in this part of the country will be higher five years hence than it is at the present time. When the productiveness of the soil, the equable climate, and all other natural advantages are considered together with transportation facilities and the great and growing demand for the products of the soil, of this section, we do not think it will ever be necessary to revise our opinion.

We note that a quarter section of land near Glidden, Iowa, sold the other day for \$84,000. Less than 10 years ago this tract was bought by Illinois parties for \$30 an acre, and those living in the vicinity thought the buyers were fools, as the tract was part of what was known as Storm Creek marsh, a famous resort for ducks, and a hunters paradise.

A drainage system made the \$30 marsh land worth \$525 an acre. The foolish fellows from Illinois cleaned up a fortune because they were wise enough to recognize the possibilities of that apparently worthless tract of land. There is absolutely no worthless land in this country; not an acre that cannot be put to profitable use, if one is sufficiently land-wise to know the particular crop to which the particular piece of land is adapted.

Five years ago the now famous Loganberry juice was comparatively unknown throughout the greater part of the United States. Now the demand cannot be supplied. The sales of this product for the first six months of 1919, was over \$400,000, while the sales for the first six months of this year was near \$800,000. This increased demand means more acres planted to Loganberries, which means more canneries and juice factories, which means more capital invested and more labor required, which means more and greater prosperity for Newberg and the land owners in this vicinity. We think the most excellent fruit lands of Yamhill county are not too high, all things being considered.

7,000,000 HUNTERS IN U. S.

According to the United States chief game warden, in the Biological Survey, United States Department of Agriculture, there are 7,000,000 hunters in the United States. This estimate was made from reports on the number of licenses issued for the various states.

In 1919 3,600,000 state licenses were issued and in addition it is estimated that 3,500,000 hunters are exempted under various state provisions. The returns to the states from licenses was approximately \$4,500,000 all of which was expended by the state in administration of the laws for the protection of game. There are approximately 2,000 salaried state game wardens and 600 fee wardens. The congressional appropriation for Federal game-warden service for protection of migratory birds is \$142,500 which permits employment of only 29 salaried wardens.

At a recent meeting of the International association of Fish, Game and Conservation Commissioners, a resolution was adopted calling for the issuance of Federal licenses for hunting migratory birds. The recommendation called for licenses in the form of special stamps to be issued by postmasters and attached to state licenses. It was estimated that the revenue derived from such licenses would amount to between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000, which could be used for the protection of game.

Desired Result.

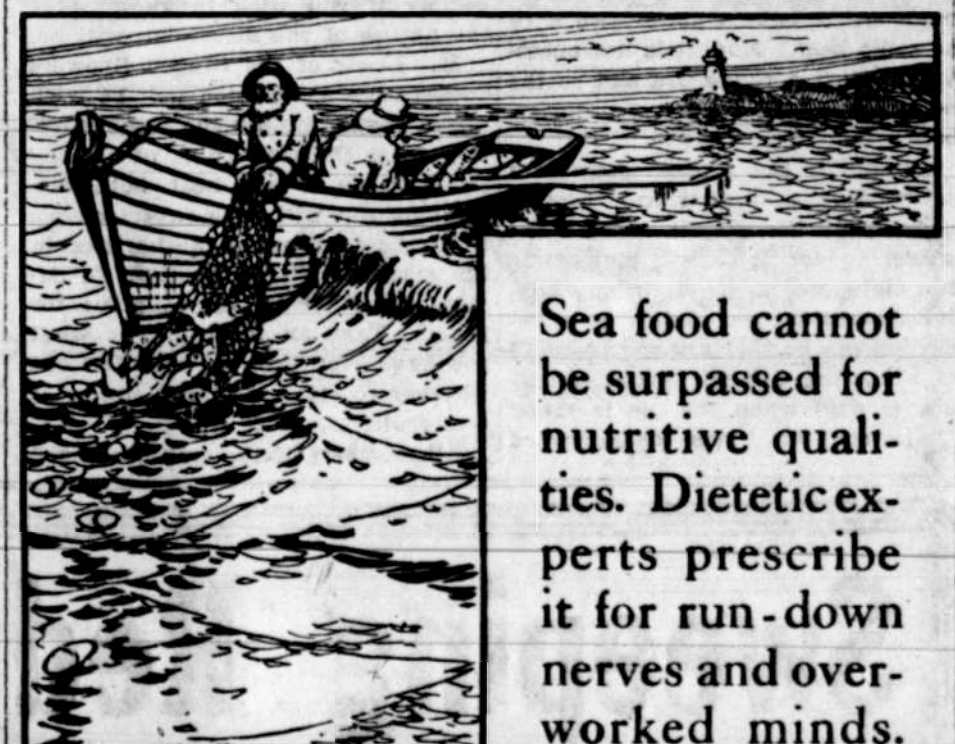
He hated having his photograph taken, but his wife indirectly had forced him to undergo the much-dreaded ordeal. When she saw the
