LAWS GOVERNING MOTOR TRUCKS

During the coming January some forty-two state legislatures will convene at the various state capitals throughout the country and endless waves of impassioned oratory will permeate the walls of legislative halls on their way to a passive public.

A review of past performances of these legislatures indicates that several thousand measures will be introduced this coming winter, involving all known and many unknown phases of motor vehicular transportation. Undoubtedly many good laws and some "weak sisters" will find their way to the statute books, for most assembliesmen are honest in their desire to enact equitable laws, but frequently they are required to vote on proposed laws without having the essential facts before them.

An instance in point is a California statute requiring motor trucks on solid tires to present an inch in width of tire surface to the road per 800 pounds of load, at the point where the tire comes in contact with the road.

A solid truck tire is narrower at the point of contact with the road surface than at the base, so that when new it presents less surface to the road than when worn. When it wears down to the surface required by law it has less elastic quality and is obviously more destructive to roads.

In other states the load to be carried usually computed on the measurement of the width of the tire at its base, but in California the law is based on the measurement at its outer surface, a practice which is at variance with the recommendations

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800 pounds per inch of tire at its base, the interests of road conservation would be served and the motor truck operator relieved of all liability of unwittingly violating the law.



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
