

Another Royal Suggestion DOUGHNUTS and CRULLERS From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

DOUGHNUTS!
There is nothing more wholesome and delightful than doughnuts or crullers rightly made.

Doughnuts
3 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beat eggs; stir in milk; add nutmeg, salt, flour and baking powder; mix together and enough additional flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4-inch thick; cut out. Fry in deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 60 seconds. Drain on unglazed paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Crullers
4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 cup milk
Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beat eggs; stir in milk; add flour, cinnamon, salt and baking powder; add one-half and mix well; add milk and remainder of dry ingredients to make soft dough. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4-inch thick and cut into strips about 1/4-inch long and 1/4-inch wide; roll in hands and twist each strip and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot fat. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.

BETTER ROADS INCREASE AUTO KILLINGS

Sixty per cent of those killed by automobiles consists of children and old people. Too thoughtless, too helpless to escape the two tons of steel hurled upon them, they are run down, crushed and mangled, sacrificial offerings upon the altar of speed.

How far will the slaughter go? Can it be halted and diminished? The terrifying increase in the number of automobile victims is principally due to the increased speed made possible by the lengthening mileage of improved highways. There are few killings on rough roads. No one in his right senses would advocate cessation of road building in order to diminish the number of automobile accidents, yet some remedy must be applied to put a stop to the bloodshed.

Ninety per cent of all automobile accidents are traceable to excessive speed or the driver's carelessness. Few drivers realize fully the terrible force of the energy they control while moving with an impetus of forty miles an hour, though the damage inflicted upon their cars while backing against a telegraph pole at very low speed should open their eyes to the potentialities. What they need is instruction and enlightenment before the mischief is done.

If the authorities will only take a firm, uncompromising stand, manslaughter on streets and highways will rapidly diminish in volume.—December Sunset.
