TRAIN HITS AUTO  
AT McMinnvilleHigh School Boys Trying To Beat  
Train To Crossing Pay  
Heavy Penalty

McMinnville, Or., Nov. 29—(Special)—Thomas Kirby, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Kirby, was instantly killed, and Robert Trent and Kevin Lawson were so badly mangled that death seems imminent, when an automobile in which they were riding was struck by the east side local electric train leaving McMinnville for Portland at 12:40 this afternoon. Edwin Kirby, a brother of the dead boy, was also in the car, but escaped without serious injury.

The accident occurred at the Fifth street crossing when the four boys, all of whom attended the local high school, were coming in to school from the Lawson place east of town. Tom Kirby was driving the car, and witnesses say he was trying to beat the train to the crossing.

Richard Bland, engineer in charge of the train, could not see the approaching automobile until too late to stop. The car, which was completely wrecked, was carried nearly a block before the train could be stopped. The three injured boys were rushed to the McMinnville hospital for treatment.

This is the second serious accident happening at this crossing, two persons having been killed at the same place two years ago. Bland is the engineer who escaped from the wreck occurring near Bertha last May, head-on.

Another engineer was called to take his train on to Portland.

The accident is a great shock to the city, as the parents were well known here. Trent was one of the star players on this year's football team.

## EGGS WORTH MORE THAN CORN

A Shawnee county farmer took a load of corn to market this week, fine, yellow, bottom-raised Kansas corn, which he had just paid a neighbor's son 10 cents a bushel for husking. His wife picked out a few hens that were not doing their duty as layers and included them with a crate of 30 dozen eggs for him to take along for ballast. He took the poultry aboard somewhat reluctantly, not wishing to be bothered with small stuff. When he got to town he let the chickens wait until he unloaded the corn at the elevator, where he received an even \$16 for the 40 bushels. Then he went to the store with the small stuff. For the hens he got \$6.80. The eggs, 30 dozen at 70 cents, brought \$21. Total \$27.80, or \$11.80 more than he received for a whole wagon load of A1 corn.—Capper's Weekly.

## PRUNE ACREAGE INCREASING

A few years ago the prune acreage in the valleys between Portland and Ashland was 11,000, according to C. I. Lewis of the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association. Now it is 40,000 acres. The Oregon crop this year is estimated at 25,000,000 pounds. Within a few years, Lewis says, the Oregon prune crop will exceed 100,000,000 pounds and hence the need of organization and co-operation to market this immense tonnage.

PEACEFUL DECEASE OF  
MISS SIBYL WOODWARD

While making a visit at the home of her sister, Mrs. W. A. King, 843 East Pine street, Portland, Miss Sibyl Woodward, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Woodward, died in the latter part of the night of November 25.

While not being in rugged health she had been getting along nicely since taking treatment in an open air sanitarium four years ago. Three weeks before her death she contracted a cold that gave her some trouble, but this she was throwing off and was busily engaged in preparing little holiday gifts for her friends, when she had a hemorrhage, the first she had ever had. Her physician said this was no cause for alarm—that if she kept quiet for a few days she would probably not have another. A second attack came, however, two days later and she passed peacefully to rest.

Deceased was born in Newberg May 15, 1882, and all her life was spent in this community. She was an earnest christian, dating from early childhood, and so far as her strength would allow, was an active worker in the various activities of the Friends church, of which she was a member. She was a great lover of flowers and it was her special delight to carry cheer to those about her with a bouquet of roses or dahlias. And the wealth of beautiful flowers that was banked about her bier at the funeral bore silent testimony to the fact that her little acts of kindly interest had not been forgotten.

Funeral services were conducted at the Friends church Sunday afternoon by her pastor, Rev. Fred E. Carter, assisted by Jesse Edwards and Pres. John D. Mills. The singing was by Mrs. Katherine Glen Kerry, of Portland, who sang three gospel hymns, playing her own accompaniment. Mrs. Kerry was one of the early music teachers in Pacific College where Miss Woodward was her pupil, and since they had been life-long friends it seemed specially fitting that Mrs. Kerry should sing at the funeral.

OREGON JERSEYS MAKING  
RECORD AWAY FROM HOME

The idea that Oregon climate is entirely responsible for the wonderful records that the dairy breeds have made in this state is disqualified by information just received that Oregon bred cows continue to produce even in a far Eastern state. A Jersey, St. Mawes Beauty, has just finished the largest of her five yearly records, making 15,796.4 pounds of milk and 824.26 pounds of fat in one year.

Beauty was bred by Ed Carry, Carlton, Oregon, and sold in 1918 to her present owner, F. W. Ayer, Ayre-dale stock farm, Bangor, Maine. Traveling across the continent did not affect this animal, as she has proved that she is a consistent producer, no matter what her surroundings or climatic conditions.

INTERESTING TALK  
BY REV. PRETLOWGives First Hand Story of Condi-  
tions in Germany As He  
Saw Them.

On Tuesday evening at Friends church Rev. Robert E. Pretlow, of Seattle, told in a most interesting way of a trip he recently made through Germany in company with Walter C. Woodward, of Richmond, Indiana.

Primarily their trip was made for the purpose of seeing for themselves the method of feeding the thousands of hungry children in that country, which is being carried on under direction of the American Friends Service Committee. This enterprise was undertaken at the earnest request of Herbert C. Hoover, and there are now more than 630,000 children and mothers being fed in 88 cities through 3,392 feeding centers.

Mr. Pretlow said that the report that Germany had an abundance of the necessities of life was a mistake. They traveled through the manufacturing districts and not one smoke-stack in twenty was showing any life. In one city 40,000 men were without employment. Scarcely any live stock of any kind were seen in the farming districts. There is practically no milk supply for needy babies. Only in one dining room in all their journey did they see a table cover, other than paper, and in this instance the linen had been taken from one of the ships that was turned over to the allies.

Everything was sacrificed on the altar of the war and Germany knows what war means, but the speaker argued that in the name of humanity children who were in no way responsible for the war should not be allowed to freeze and starve.

They were most kindly received wherever they went, the service star which they were being a sufficient "passport" to enable them to reach the hearts of the people.
