HIGH SCHOOL

A High Y. Club was organized Friday afternoon, January 7. There had been considerable discussion about the club, and, finally, through Mr. Newmyer's efforts a High Y. Club was started.

A "pep" meeting was held Friday at the close of school for the game with Corvallis. Evidently the new organization "moved things," as Newberg won the game.

The high school is putting on an extensive campaign for subscriptions to the "Country Gentleman." The subscription price is one dollar (\$1.00) per year, and the school receives as a commission 50 cents on every dollar. The campaign began last Tuesday, and will end Monday, January 17. The school is divided into two teams, the Seniors and Sophomores vs. Junior and Freshmen. The winning side in the campaign is to be entertained by the losing side.

This department is entirely self-supporting. The money for needed supplies is obtained from the sale of the cooked products during noon hour.

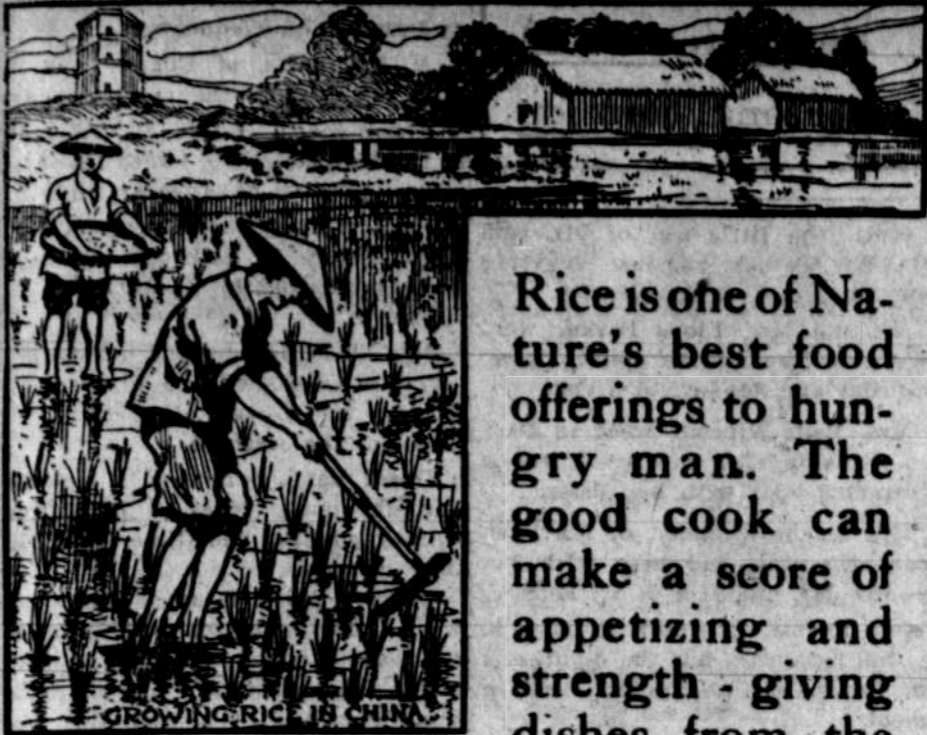
