CALL FOR SEALED BIDS

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with chapter 32, session laws of 1920, the State Land Board of the state of Oregon will receive sealed bids at its office in the Capitol building at Salem, Oregon, up to 10:30 o'clock a. m., February 1, 1921, for a lease and permit to take, remove and sell, sand, rock and gravel from those portions of the Willamette river in the counties of Clackamas, Yamhill and Marion, state of Oregon, described as follows:

No. 1: That portion of the bed of the Willamette river between its junction with the north boundary of section 2, T. 4 S. R. 2 W., W. M., and the west boundary of the northeast quarter of north east quarter of said section 2, being in Yamhill and Marion counties, Oregon.

No. 2: That portion of the Willamette river between its junction with the west boundary of section 32, T. 3 S. R. 1 W., W. M., and the north and south half section line of said section 32, being in Yamhill and Marion counties, Oregon.

No. 3: That portion of the bed of the Willamette river between its junction with the north and south half section line of section 23, T. 3 S. R. 1 W. W. M. and the north and south half section line of section 24, said township and range, being in Clackamas County, Oregon.

No. 4: That portion of the bed of the Willamette river between its junction with the west boundary of section 21, T. 3 S. R. 1 E. W. M., and the east and west half section line of said section 21, being in Clackamas County, Oregon.

No. 5: That portion of the bed of the Willamette river between its junction with the south boundary of section 22, T. 3 S. R. 1 E. of W. M., and the north boundary of said section 22, being in Clackamas County, Oregon.

No. 6: That portion of the bed of the Willamette river lying between its junction with the center line of Twelfth street of Oregon City, extended, and the center line of Edison street of Oregon City, extended, being in Clackamas County, Oregon.

No. 7: That portion of the bed of the Willamette river between its junction with the south boundary of section 19, T. 2 S. R. 2 E. W. M., and the east and west half section line of section 24, T. 2 S. R. 1 E. W. M., being in Clackamas County, Oregon.

No. 8: That portion of the bed of the Willamette river between the junction with the south boundary of the northeast quarter of northeast quarter of section 24, T. 2 S. R. 1 E. W. M., and the north and south half section line of section 13, said township and range, being in Clackamas County, Oregon.

Such bids shall specify the amount offered per cubic yard and the minimum yardage which bidder agrees to remove or pay for each year and the term of years for which lease is desired, and shall be accompanied by certified check for 10 per cent of the amount of the bid for one year and by map in triplicate, showing premises and ownership of abutting premises and residence and post office address of such owner or owners.

The Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids, whether before or after the award, or if the bidder refuses or shall fail or neglect to execute the contract and furnish the bond specified or required by the Board, and reserves the right to lease the whole of the above described premises or any portion thereof, and the riparian owner, his assigns or representatives, subject to rules and regulations adopted and promulgated by the State Land Board, will be given preference right to lease at the highest price offered, said right to be exercised within five days after the opening of bids, subject, further, wholly within the discretion of the Board, the right to lease to persons who have done development work, together with actual operations within the year 1919.

All bids shall be made subject to the terms, provisions and conditions of the rules and regulations adopted and promulgated by the State Land Board of the state of Oregon, for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the provisions of chapter 32, of the General Laws of Oregon, adopted at the special legislative session of 1920, and on file with the undersigned and open to public inspection.
