CHRISTIAN CHURCH HOLDS ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

The 14th anniversary and annual business meeting of this congregation was held on Saturday of last week. The program, which occupied the whole day, was most interesting and versatile. Opening with song and roll call, the business reports of all the auxiliaries of the church were read, each of them showing an increase in the work during the year and were of such a nature as to lend enthusiasm to the meeting. Mr. Hicks, pastor of the church at Yamhill, was the chief speaker in the morning, and his address entitled, "The Price of Power," was very helpful. The other addresses of the day were delivered by G. Schmidt, "The Commission;" L. Jones, "A Fighting Church;" M. Leavitt, "If Not Christ, Whom?" These three young men are Newberg boys who are attending Eugene Bible University and are active in the ministry. Music had a large place in the program and included, besides congregational singing, duets by Mrs. Arney and Della Parrish, Freda Parrish and Mrs. O. McCoy; solos by Mrs. David and Mr. Phillips; a piano selection by Thelma Parrish, and a cornet duet by Henry Adolph and Arthur Parrish.

Dinner was served by the women, and at the two sessions of this pleasant period about 130 to 140 were cared for in splendid fashion. About 45 returned for supper and enjoyed another good meal. Following the hour conducted by the Endeavor society the day was concluded by an address by the pastor, who enlarged upon the necessity and benefit of cooperation, appreciation and determination. Taken all in all the day proved to be one of the most pleasant and inspiring annual meetings this church has held.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NOTES

The Endeavor meeting on Sunday was led by Miss Olga Keller, and proved very interesting and was well attended. The topic, "The Lord's Day," was well treated, bringing out a number of valuable truths from the Word, such as that the Lord's Day is the Christian Sabbath, the Sabbath of the New Testament and the Church of Christ in all ages; that those who put Saturday into the fourth commandment are trying to change the law, for there is no hint of Saturday in the fourth commandment, nor of any specified day of the week, but only of each seventh day; and that for the Church of Christ this seventh day is the Lord's Day and always has been.

The Wednesday evening meeting was omitted this week on account of the pastor's absence at Eugene attending Presbytery there.

The usual annual reports are now all in, and show a flattering condition in the church. The Sabbath school is coming back to the best it has ever been; the Y. P. S. C. E. is advancing in attendance and membership. The finances of the church show something over \$3000 reported, besides other accounts that were not reported. A better year is looked for than any preceding year, especially in the growing membership. And this church takes loving pleasure too in the growth of its sister evangelical churches, with which it seeks the moral and spiritual good of the town as well as its temporal good.

The Ladies' Aid society meets this week at the home of Mrs. C. H. Clark, 301 E. 2nd St., and all the ladies of the congregation are urged to attend.

The Sabbath school session next Sabbath will take place at the usual hour, 9:45 promptly, with provision for classes of all ages. Any persons of Presbyterian inclination or who

do not send their children anywhere, are cordially invited to look into the work of this Sabbath school.

The morning sermon will discuss the question, "What Have We to Offer Besides Christ?" And the evening theme will be "Exciting Amusements, as the Movies, etc."

The leader of the Y. P. S. C. E. meeting at 6:30 will be Miss Grace Colby and the topic, "Our Recreations." A good place for all our young people.

Parents should take interest in this matter of recreations which is to be taken up in all our churches by request next Sabbath. It is of vital interest and importance. What a person does for recreation or instead of it, often determines his destiny.

Five new members have already been received into the church here, of the thirty or forty that is our goal before the year's close in March, 1922. The Sunday school classes and departments of the church and its individual members are getting busy. The only requirement for membership in this church is acceptance of Christ and the desire to lead a Christian life and be in the Church of Christ. Such persons make known to the pastor in any way their desire, and then meet the session or elders of the church for a few moments of prayer and conference. The session then receives them into the Church of Christ, and they are publicly welcomed on the following communion Sabbath. It is a tremendous privilege to be a member of the church of the living and loving God. And the Presbyterian church is such a church.

NOTES FROM OREGON GROWERS COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATION

From the packing plants of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association more than 1,000,000 pounds of small sized prunes are being shipped to Germany by way of Sweden. Shipments will be from Portland via the Panama canal to Rotterdam.

Farmers in the vicinity of Salem are in earnest about broccoli growing. Already 110 acres have been pledged, and it is thought that the acreage will amount to more than 150. It is figured that 75 cents worth of broccoli seed will pay for planting one acre. Seed is worth \$5.00 a pound.

Senator Charles L. McNary writes the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association that the Fordney tariff bill, which provides a duty of three cents a pound on imports of cherries, will pass at the present session of congress. Also that he hopes to include in the bill other fruit products.

The Oregon Growers Cooperative Association has been carrying on experiments in canning broccoli, and has been so successful that samples have been sent to eastern brokers, where a big market awaits canned broccoli.

The state of Washington is going after the loganberry industry, of which Oregon now has 85 per cent. From Marion county there has been shipped this past winter 2,000,000 loganberry plants, mostly to northern Washington. On a basis of 660 plants to the acre, this means more than 3,000 acres, which will be in commercial bearing in two years. Oregon is credited in government reports with 5,500 acres. C. L. Lewis of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association estimates that within a few years there will be 10,000 acres of bearing loganberries in Oregon. On an average of 3,000 pounds to the acre, this would mean a crop of 30,000,000 pounds.

McMinnville Man on Chantauqua

E. Lorne Knight returned home Saturday from a most enjoyable trip east and south, where he accompanied the noted explorer, V. Stefansson, his former chief, on the expedition to the Arctic regions on a lecture tour. Mr. Knight, while in New York City, was elected a member of the Explorers' club, an honor which comes to but few men.

Mr. Knight goes to Arizona in May to join the seven-day circuit of the Ellison-White system. Mr. Knight is to appear with moving pictures of the far north, revealing scenes taken in the northland during the Stefansson expedition in which Mr. Knight participated. — McMinnville News-Reporter.

PERE ANN WATSON

Phebe Ann Watson was born in Indiana, June 1, 1833, and when a small child moved with her parents to Charlestown, Iowa, where she grew to womanhood.

She was married to Leonard Ormsby on December 22, 1847, and to this union one child was born, Mrs. Edith May Hayman. He having departed this life August 10, 1871. On December 5, 1873, she was married to Robert S. Wells, and to this union was born two children, Mrs. E. C. Moore, and Mrs. G. F. Drisgill of Seattle, Wash.

After the death of her husband in

April, 1903, she moved to Washington to make her home with her daughter, Mrs. Hayman, and after five years came to Newberg, where she resided until her death on March 31, 1921.

She united with the Baptist church in early childhood and lived a consistent Christian life, and departed this life at the age of 71 years and 10 months.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Jewell at the Baptist church and followed by interment at Friends cemetery.

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
