A CONTRAST

Our attention has been called to two tributes which were paid to the late Dr. Harry Littlefield on the day of his funeral and which are in themselves a sermon for us all. Nearly everyone who has been in the community for any length of time remembers "Old Gee," who with his little white dog, was a character about town for a number of years, having a portable cabin near the cannery and selling garden truck. About a year ago Gee disappeared and it has been learned that he moved his shack a few miles beyond Woodburn. On the day of the Littlefield funeral, Gee walked all the way from Woodburn to Newberg to be at the funeral and his faithful white dog trotted along with him. Arriving at the church while the funeral was in progress he carefully approached to see the remains, dropped beside the casket and those who were present say his cries to the corpse were truly pitiful. Among other things he said, "Doc Littlefield, Gee's here; Gee, your friend, is here." Some may scoff at this tribute of affection, but we venture to assert that there are few, if any, white persons who would walk twenty miles or more to do homage to the remains of one whom they revered. Some will say he was only an ignorant Chinaman. Yes, he was, but he had that finer instinct, that something which few men possess and yet which we cannot help admire, which led him to sacrifice his physical feelings, walk more than twenty miles and fall before the remains of one who, perhaps in life, had befriended him. It was certainly a fine tribute and should raise our estimate of this Chinaman.

On the other hand, on the same day two of our own boys, about eighteen years old, were seen parading up and down on the street just east of the bridge, and when the funeral procession passed those boys went through mock salutes and in various ways conveyed their contempt for the honor which was being paid to the last remains of one who had given his life to protect our nation in a most critical period. It is with a feeling of shame that we have to admit that they were boys from our own race. Boys who have had all of the advantages of our civilization and our culture and training. When contrasted with the fine tribute of the poor Chinaman, their acts stand out with even

greater stigma. Perhaps it was only thoughtlessness on the part of these two youths, but it is a sad commentary upon their training and their characters that they should be so thoughtless.

We are all proud of the wonderful fine things which our soldier boys did in Europe. We are proud of those who sacrificed their youth and, in many instances, their health and very life for all of us. And it was nothing more than a small token of our respect which prompted the closing of business houses and the attendance at and the contribution towards the paying of respect to Dr. Littlefield. We can scarcely conceive of one so small, so thoughtless, so ungrateful, as to mock at those who were paying these respects. The war should have created a different spirit in our youth and we hope that those boys, nor any others, will ever be so guilty again.

"THE BERRIANS"

Last Saturday the people of this community gave their unanimous approval to the idea of naming an organization which shall advertise and boost for the community, "The Berrians." Newberg has a good live commercial club which has already accomplished many things for the community and now, with the forming of "The Berrians" as a live wire booster organization, Newberg should become known all over the country.

There should be no conflict between the commercial club and "The Berrians," for the latter organization will no doubt occupy an entirely different sphere in the community life just as do the Rosarians and Cherrians and Prunarians in their communities. Moreover, The Berrians should draw in both the farmers and the citizens of Newberg to make up an organization that will do much to put the entire community on the map in a real way.

Every person who owns property in or near Newberg; every business man who gets his business from the community; every farmer and fruit grower; every salaried employee who owes his livelihood to the community's development should get behind this movement. If we get such a united organization boosting for our community there is no limit to what we can accomplish. The committee is working on plans for the actual organization. Announcements will be made later regarding this and a meeting will be held. Watch for the announcements and dates and help boost The Berrians. It is for your good.

The Weekly Corvallis Gazette Times came out with a two section sixteen page edition the past week in which they featured large ads from most of the enterprising merchants in that city on a dollar day proposition. It was a good publicity proposition. United effort of this sort on the part of the merchants brings the people from the surrounding country into town and is a good proposition both for the merchant and the farm-

ers, as it enables them to do more shopping at one trip.
