D. S. Work Progresses

The girls of the Domestic Science department are still keeping up the reputation of being good cooks. Among the things which they serve at noon are, all kinds of pies, cakes, salads, soups and sometimes a full dinner, consisting of mashed potatoes, gravy and meat. One of the things that the girls are very successful with is the gingerbread made from an original recipe, which is as follows: 3 cups flour, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 cup molasses, 2 eggs, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup lard. Mix dry ingredients and add molasses with soda, milk, eggs and melted lard. Beat smooth and bake in a sheet for about one hour.

A visit was made also to Meadowvale farm to see sheep and goats. FARM POINTERS

(By O. A. C. Experiment Station.)
If stable manure is used, it is advisable to put it on before plowing or disking. It should be well rotted and if applied after plowing it should be thoroughly harrowed in. Well rotted stable manure can still be used for late crops and rank feeding crops such as corn or kale. The O. A. C. experiment station has realized from \$2.50 to \$10 a ton on stable manure applied for forage crops.

Pocket gophers at this season of the year are very destructive in a clover or alfalfa meadow. A gopher killed now often prevents the destruction by a family of gophers later on.

A good yield of potatoes is impossible with only half a stand. The surest way is to get a good stand first and then take care of the plants.

The 5000 bushels of certified potato seed of this state are largely sold out now. Good seed is scarce and hard to get. Be sure to treat before planting.

Field peas or vetch for forage or seed should not be planted now in most of the sections of the Willamette Valley, as the season has advanced too far.

Pear and cherry slugs can be controlled by application of the codling moth lead arsenate "30-day" spray, 3-200. This spray is also effective when the pests appear.

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SAVE THE CHILD

With the observance of the days between April 24 and May 1st as national children's week, the old question of the prophet may be revived and applied to the children of this day and age. "Is it well with the child?" in his present environment of the home? Is this chief school of all virtues measuring up to its responsibilities? With the demands of the age requiring the custody of the children to often devolve upon someone other than the parents, with the street a preferable playground to the living room, with the old-time custom of family prayers now almost obsolete it is feared that we cannot say it is well with the child. But is it well with the child in the public school? Surely here he is safe. Is not the present tendency to magnify the importance of mathematics above that of manners a sad comment upon the curricula. Is it well when the theory of evolution is of greater importance in the high schools than that of ethics? Is it well when science and social and political economy are essential to his success, but religion is but a "refined form of superstition?" Is it well with the child in society? What has the great outside world to offer him? Is it well when on every hand are pleasures that appeal only to the baser passions, when his blood is caused to rise at the pictures of desperadoes and vamps? Is it well when he is early at the mercy of the jazz dance hall? Is it well when men are prepared to make a living by retelling to him such injurious commodities as the cigar, cigarette, etc.? To ask the question in regard to the reformatories and detention schools is but to answer it. The saddest commentary upon the failure of parent and state alike to improve child conditions is the crowded condition of the state reform schools and private and public homes for unfortunate children. It is not well with the child when the Oregon legislature "because of the constantly increasing number of dependant, delinquent and incorrigible children, already a menace and burden to the state" appointed a commission of five to report upon child welfare in this state. Save the child is a timely slogan for the Bible schools of the country. For one hour of the week they endeavor to instill a knowledge of the things of God—the foundation of all true knowledge and the antidote to the poisonous doctrines of the world. Save the child and you save America for the boy of today must soon be the man who will handle the reins of government and God pity the country should it fall into the hands of Godless men. Every citizen owes it to himself, the country and the children to help the Bible schools save the child. C. H. Phillips.
