OREGON GROWERS

The Oregon Growers' Cooperative association has advanced its prices on prunes according to an announcement made by R. C. Paulus, general manager.

The association is now getting nine cents a pound for prunes, 40-50 size, packed in 25-pound boxes, f.o.b. the coast and in some instances a better price. Efforts are now being made by the association to strengthen the price on smaller sizes of about one cent a pound.

California is pretty well cleaned up on small sized prunes and the association holds most of the 40-50s now in the northwest.

Although it is a little early to form a definite estimate of the prune crop reports are coming to the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association from all prune districts which indicate considerable loss, especially in the hill orchards. These blossomed a little later than the lower lands and were caught in the rain and cold weather during the blossoming period.

The Oregon Growers' Cooperative association will handle a broccoli crop next season from 500 acres or more. Already in the Willamette Valley, in addition to the Salem section, seed has been furnished members of the association who will plant 294 acres. The Roseburg district, whose crop is mostly handled by the association, will probably put in 250 acres of broccoli this season.

Seed has been furnished members of the association in the Willamette Valley as follows: Independence, 115 acres; Amity district, 36 acres; Newberg, 26 acres; Rickreall district, 35 acres; Sheridan, 42 acres, and Chemawa district 20 acres.

During the past season the association sold 27,514 crates of broccoli, developing 38 markets through its selling organization.

The English people are still eating Oregon prunes and seem to like them pretty well. During the past week the Oregon Growers' association shipped more than 100,000 pounds to London. In addition to these last shipments, London has bought 411,000 pounds of Oregon prunes this past winter, and Liverpool 419,050 pounds.

Apple growers of western Oregon are at least looking a prosperous year in the face. According to private advices to the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association, and also the government's figures, at least 50 per cent of the apple crop east of the Rocky mountains has been ruined by cold weather. This includes the big apple growing states of Michigan and New York.

W. C. T. U. AND MISSIONARY CONVENTION HEAR PAPERS

(Continued from last week)

"The Woman's Christian Temperance Union is now organized in forty different countries of the world and scientific temperance is being taught in many schools, and here long this teaching will be in all the schools of Europe and the Orient. So great is the work of this organization appreciated by church missionaries that appeals are constantly being received from them to hasten with more of our workers. Many governments, too, are expressing appreciation by offering liberal financial aid. Uruguay and Argentine Republic each have offered the National W. C. T. U. a gift of \$15,000 if we would establish headquarters in these far away corners of the world. Miss Anna Gordon, national president for the W. C. T. U. in U. S. A., has recently sailed for South America for the purpose of learning first hand the real needs of the work."

The home field was also touched upon by the speaker when by telling illustrations from her own personal experience with the foreign speaking people, she showed us something of our wicked indifference and criminal neglect of the millions whom we have invited to our shores. Coming as they are at the rate of 10,000 every day, it is self evident that either we must Americanize them or they will foreignize us. We have been sending missionaries to all parts of the world to evangelize the world: today God is bringing the world to America to be evangelized. Are we ready for the big task?

The discussion on "Christian Citizenship" was also led by Mrs. Han-non, followed by several speakers. Some very good points were brought out. It was thought it would be necessary for women to get into politics more; join one of the parties, using it as a medium through which they can speak. We should see that the laws which we have on our statute books are enforced.

Miss Ethel Morris-Johnston sang that beautiful song "The Homeland," which was very much appreciated.

An interesting talk was given us by Mrs. Childs, in which she related several experiences of Carry A Nation. This is the correct way to spell her name. Mrs. Childs was personally acquainted with Carry Nation. She described her as a quiet, meek little woman—just the opposite of what we thought her to be, because she carried on such a campaign against the saloons. It seems that Kansas had a prohibition law but was not enforcing it. Carry did a great deal toward the enforcement of those laws.

Rev. Louise Rounds gave some startling figures on the cost of war and urged us to work for peace.

Visitors were present from West Chehalis and Chehalis Center. A bountiful luncheon was served at the noon hour in the basement of the church. About one hundred attended the afternoon session.

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BIG DAYS AT UNIVERSITY

MAY 19, 20, 21, AND 22

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 9.—Junior Week-end at the University of Oregon, the big annual event which students all over the state look forward to, will come this year on May 19, 20, 21 and 22. The purpose of Junior Week-end is to establish a closer relation between the students of the University of Oregon and high school students throughout the state.

The program, in brief, includes:
Wednesday—Preliminaries of state high school debate contest.

Thursday evening—Canoe fete.

Friday (Campus day)—Underclassmen tug-of-war, followed by burning of green caps; finals of debate contest; baseball game between Oregon and O. A. C.; Pacific Coast tennis tournament; and in the evening the senior class play, "Nothing But the Truth," at the Eugene theatre.

On Saturday the finals of the tennis tournament will be played off and there will be a second game of baseball with O. A. C. At 1:30 p. m., on Hayward field, the Pacific Coast conference track meet will be held, for the first time at the University.

Another feature of the week-end will be the first convention for editors of high school papers, which will be held under the auspices of the School of Journalism.

The events of the week-end will be filmed, and the films will later be sent out through the extension department to various parts of the state.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Considerable difference of opinion exists with reference to the condition of the fruit crop of the state. It is known that there was considerable damage to early fruits such as peaches and apricots, from freezing, in some sections, while other sections suffered no injury. Just what effect the continued rainy weather of the latter part of April and early May has had on pollenization is yet to be determined. In some parts of the state apples are just now in full bloom and the amount of fruit that will set is yet to be determined.

Advices from our Washington, D. C., office state that "the territory in which fruit has been severely damaged by freezes has increased in size and now embraces portions of the central belt of the United States as far west as the Rocky mountains. The severe frost of April 24 and 25 probably caused almost a complete failure of cherries, apricots and peaches in the southern counties of Idaho and damaged peaches considerably in Utah. The berry crop throughout the country has apparently escaped serious injury."
