THE HIGH SCHOOL
AGRICULTURAL NOTES

(Over F. Kilham)
Considerable interest is being manifested locally concerning "The Smith-Hughes Act" (Public No. 347-64 Congress) (S. 703) under which the Newberg high school agriculture department is operating.

Section 1 of the act reads as follows:

"An act to provide for the promotion of vocational education; to provide for cooperation with the states in the promotion of such education in agriculture and the trades and industries; provide for cooperation with the states in the preparation of teachers of vocational subjects; "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that there is hereby annually appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated; the sum provided in sections 2, 3 and 4 of this act, to be paid to the respective states for the purpose of cooperating with the states, in paying the salaries of teachers, supervisors and directors of agricultural subjects, and teachers of trade, home economics and industrial subjects, and in preparation of teachers of agricultural, trade, industrial, and home economics subjects; and the sum provided for in section 7 for the use of the Federal Board for Vocational Education for the administration of this act and for the purpose of making studies, investigations and reports to aid in the organization and conduct of vocational education, which sums shall be expended as hereinafter provided."

The act as a whole is long and full of legal phraseology, but may perhaps be summarized as to its principal parts, in the following manner:

Section 2 appropriates "for the purpose of cooperating with the states in paying the salaries of teachers, supervisors or directors of agricultural subjects" from and including June 30, 1918, to and including June 30, 1926, a sum total of \$14,469,000. The actual amount appropriated for the year 1926, and for each and every year thereafter under section 2, is \$3,027,000. "Said sums allotted to the states in the proportion which their rural population bears to the total rural population in the United States, not including outlying possessions, according to the last preceding United States census."

Section 3 appropriates for the purpose of cooperating with the states in paying the salaries of teachers of trade, home economics and industrial subjects, "from and including June 30, 1918, to and including June 30, 1926, a sum total of \$17,710,000 or but \$3,241,000 more than for agriculture alone, wherein did Congress truly show great wisdom and foresight. Twenty per cent of this appropriation only shall be spent for home economics teachers' salaries. The actual amount appropriated for the year 1920, and for each and every year thereafter under section 3, is \$3,346,000. "Said sums allotted to the states in the proportion which their urban population bears to the total urban population in the United States, not including outlying possessions, according to the last preceding United States census."

Section 4 appropriated "for the purpose of cooperating with the states in preparing teachers, supervisors, and directors of agricultural subjects and teachers of trade and industrial and home economics subjects" from and including June 30, 1918, to and including June 30, 1921, a sum total of \$3,292,000. The actual amount appropriated for the year 1920, and for each and every year thereafter under section 4, is \$1,090,000. Said sums allotted to the states in the proportion which their population bears to the total population of the United States not including, etc."

Section 6 reads in part: "A Federal Board for Vocational Education is hereby created, to consist of the Secretary of Agriculture, the Secretary of Commerce, the Secretary of Labor, the United States Commissioner of Education, and three citizens of the United States to be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the senate. One of said three citizens shall be a representative of the manufacturing and commercial interests, one a representative of the agricultural interests, and one a representative of labor. The members of the board other than the members of the cabinet and the United States Commissioner of Education shall receive a salary of \$5,000 per annum. The Board shall have power to cooperate with state boards in carrying out the provisions of this act; the state board or local board, or both, to match dollar for dollar the Federal allotment."

We have for the purpose of cooperating with the Federal board and the local school boards the Oregon state board for vocational education, with Supt. J. A. Churchill as executive officer, and E. E. Elliott as director. As supervisor we have E. E. Elliott for agriculture, Bertha Stewart Davis for home economics, and A. R. Nichols for trade and industries. To carry out the organization idea, the local director of Smith-Hughes agriculture is directly responsible to the state supervisor for the carrying out of the minimum requirements of the law by the local school board. Then the responsibility ascends through the various channels outlined to the Federal government as represented by the President as administrative officer.

It will be recognized that the local Smith-Hughes director has a very much greater responsibility than the average teacher. He is in very truth, a "community helper" in agriculture, home economics or in the trades and industries, whose day is unlimited as to hours. He is at one and the same time, an originator and a coordinator along his own vocational line. All do not have this big conception of the

Smith-Hughes department, which is, however, the right conception.

The minimum requirement for maintenance in this state of the Smith-Hughes high school agriculture department under Smith-Hughes subsidy is as follows:

1. Not less than \$150.00 must be available at the outset for purchase of strictly agriculture equipment.
2. Not less than \$20.00 must be available at the outset for purchase of necessary library literature equipment.
3. A minimum salary of \$1800 for a teacher of agriculture employed for twelve months, of which the local board has had to pay only one-third, at least one month of said time to be allowed the instructor for vacation or professional improvement.
4. Funds for transportation of teacher in supervision of practical work of students.
5. An annual maintenance fund of not less than \$5.00 per pupil, to be available to the teacher at all times for incidental expenses.

This minimum requirement was last approved by the Federal Board, December 16, 1920, and holds good as stated, at the present time.
