

TRAINLOAD OF MIDDLE-WEST SETTLERS TO TOUR OREGON

The route to be traveled through the state by the first trainload of settlers who are scheduled to arrive from the Middle West on July 21st the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce last Thursday.

The task of arranging an itinerary which would include the representative districts of the state in the limited time allowed under the homeseekers' ticket, twenty-one days, was an exceedingly difficult one, according to Secretary Quayle. The matter has been under advisement since the Land Settlement Conference held in Portland June 7th, and every effort has been made to route the party over the state in the most effective way, according to Quayle.

While the itinerary in general will be followed as outlined, it was announced that it was subject to change in some instances. Inasmuch as the routing of the party through a few districts would be governed by the number of settlers who make up the party.

The itinerary follows:
July 20—Omaha—Leave 1:20 a. m.

July 21—Ontario—Arrive 2:30 p. m., leave midnight. (Auto trip visiting Nyssa, Vale and over Warm Springs irrigation project, with dinner that evening at Ontario.)

July 22—Baker—Arrive 3:30 a. m., leave 11:00 p. m. (Breakfast luncheon and dinner at Baker.)

July 23—La Grande—Arrive 1:00 a. m., leave 11:00 p. m. (Breakfast, luncheon and dinner at La Grande.)

July 24—Joseph—Arrive 4:00 a. m., leave Enterprise 10:00 p. m. (Breakfast at Wallowa Lake. Trip through Wallowa Valley to Enterprise.)

July 25—Pendleton—Arrive 6:00 a. m., leave Hermiston 10:00 p. m. (After drive through Umatilla county wheat fields, luncheon will be served at Echo or Stanfield. Party will then be taken through Government Irrigation Project to Hermiston, where dinner will be served.)

July 26—Bend—Arrive 7:00 a. m., where party detains. (After breakfast at Bend, party will be taken by automobiles to Redmond and on to Prineville for luncheon. After luncheon, party will be driven to Madras for dinner, remaining at Madras all night.)

July 26—Madras—(After breakfast at Madras, party will be taken to Maupin, where luncheon will be served and on to The Dalles for dinner, remaining all night at The Dalles.)

July 28—The Dalles—(After breakfast at The Dalles, party will be driven to Hood River for luncheon and Portland for dinner, remaining in Portland all night.)

July 29—Portland—(After breakfast at Portland, party will be met by delegates from different sections of Western Oregon, some taken down the river to Astoria, south to Tillamook and catch the party the evening of the 30th at Salem. Others of the party will be taken through Washington county, Yamhill county and part of Polk county, arriving at Salem the evening of the 30th. Others will be taken via Oregon City, Aurora and branch roads, arriving at Salem the 30th. Others may spend a day in and around Portland, so that the entire party may reach Salem for dinner the evening of the 30th. The full party to have dinner at Salem the evening of the 30th, remaining all night at Salem.)

July 31—Eugene—(Party leaving Salem, morning of the 31st will cover towns between Salem and Eugene party dividing covering territory both sides of Willamette River, arriving at Eugene for dinner and all night.)

July 31—Coos Bay—(Any of the party desiring to visit Coos Bay district rather than country between Eugene and Roseburg may take 1:00 a. m. train out of Eugene August 1st, arrive Marshfield 7:00 a. m. same day; thence by automobiles to Roseburg and meet main party for dinner at Roseburg same evening, August 1st. Fare Eugene to Marshfield, \$6.32; sleeper, lower \$3.24, upper \$2.59.)

August 1—Roseburg—(After breakfast at Eugene party will cover territory between there and Roseburg, arriving in Roseburg for dinner and all night.)

August 2—Medford-Ashland—(After breakfast at Roseburg, party will cover territory between there and Ashland, arriving at Ashland for dinner and all night.)

August 3—Klamath Falls—(After breakfast at Ashland, party will be taken to Klamath Falls for dinner and all night. Party will be met by Directors of Oregon State Chamber of Commerce at Klamath Falls.)

August 4—Crater Lake—(After breakfast and luncheon at Klamath Falls, party will be conveyed to Crater Lake for dinner and all night.)

August 5—Bend—(After breakfast at Crater Lake, party will proceed to Bend and take the train for Omaha and Kansas City.)

August 6—Train leaves Bend at 7:00 a. m., August 6th.

August 8—Omaha—Arrive 8:45 p. m.

August 9—Kansas City—Arrive 9:15 a. m.

DUCK RAISING IS PROFITABLE

Pekins Are Most Popular Breed for Production of Meat and Runners for Eggs.

Although ducks do not appear to be as well adapted as chickens as a source of income to average farm conditions, yet many farmers are finding duck raising profitable as a side issue to their other farm operations. The demand for table ducks in the cities seems to be on the increase.

The period of incubation for ducks' eggs is 28 days, except for the Muscovy duck, which is 33 to 35 days. The eggs may be hatched either naturally by hens or ducks or artificially in incubators. Strong, fertile eggs are a prime essential to good hatching and are obtained only from stock properly mated and kept under the best possible conditions to secure health and vigor. Eggs from overfat breeding stock do not usually produce a large percentage of strong ducklings. Pekin and Indian Runner ducks rarely sit; consequently, if natural methods of incubation are to be used the eggs are usually hatched under hens. Duck eggs should be washed if dirty, for it does not appear to injure their hatching qualities.

Before setting a hen dust her thoroughly with insect powder. In applying this powder hold the hen by the feet, with her head hanging down, and work it thoroughly into the feathers, giving special attention around the vent and under the wings. Sitting hens should be fed whole or cracked grains, such as corn or wheat. Place 9 to 11 ducks' eggs under a hen, depending on her size and the season of the year, using the smaller number of eggs in cold weather and the larger number in warm weather. Confine the hens at hatching time and do not disturb them until they become restless, when it may be best to remove the ducklings that hatched first.

Hens must be well cared for in hatching ducks' eggs, as the period of incubation is a week longer than that of hens' eggs. It usually takes duck-

lings from 24 to 48 hours to hatch after they pick the shells; therefore it is advisable to allow the hen to get off the nest for feed and water when the first ducklings pick the shell and then confine her to the nest until the hatching is over. Ducks' eggs need more moisture than hens' eggs at hatching time, as it takes the ducks much longer to get out of the shell. Poultry specialists in the United States Department of Agriculture advise, therefore, that the eggs should be sprinkled liberally with warm water previous to hatching.

All duck eggs should be tested at least twice during incubation, preferably on the seventh and fourteenth days, and the infertile eggs and those with dead germs removed. Dead germs in duck eggs decompose very rapidly and are often detected by their odor and should be removed from the incubator.

Duck eggs having pure white shells can be tested as early as the fourth or fifth day and the infertile eggs sold to bakers for use in the kitchen.

Ducks are much easier to brood artificially than chickens, but they may also be raised under hens successfully. If raised by the latter method, it is advisable to confine the hens and allow the ducklings free range, as the hens are apt to wander too far away with their broods. Ducklings which are to be sold as green ducks are not usually allowed much range, but are fed heavily and forced for rapid growth. The ducklings which are to be kept for breeding should have the web of their feet punched, using a different number of punch marks for each year so that their age can be readily determined.

SELECT EGGS FOR SETTING

Avoid Those That Are Abnormally Small and Poorly Shaped—Stick to One Color.

Eggs that are abnormally small and poorly shaped should not be used for incubation; neither should eggs that have thin or very porous shells, say specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. If possible, eggs should be set when fresh, and it is never advisable to use for hatching eggs that are more than two weeks old. One of the quickest ways to obtain uniformity in the off spring is to select uniformly good-sized eggs of the same color.
