So philosophized Wallace Reid, after he had finished a big fight scene in "Always Audacious," which will be shown at the Baker Theatre Friday and Saturday nights. The fight in question is one of the unique features of this new picture, in which Mr. Reid plays a double role—portraying both the hero and the villain and the former seeks out the latter and thrashes him soundly with his fists, giving him a black eye in the melee. There are many interesting situations and complications in the picture which is founded on Ben Ames Williams' Saturday Evening Post story, "Toujours de L'Audace."

Harry Carey, ace of the western drama, Carol Holloway, a new and usually beautiful leading woman, a vigorous story of the out of doors and the appealing work of a new kiddie-actor are some of the features of "If Only Jim" which will be shown at the Baker on Monday and Tuesday evenings. From then on Jim Golden snaps out of his lethargy and makes the town sit up in a noticing attitude. Dramatic situations follow one another at breathless speed until the climax, which is unique among screen denouements.

Pa's pretty frisky after all! There are lots of self-satisfied young fellows who seem to think their fathers are out of the running until something happens to wake them up. That's what occurs in "An Amateur Devil," Bryant Washburn's next picture at the Baker on Wednesday and Thursday nights. Carver Endicott, a rather too precise young man, tires his fiancée with his peevish love making. In desperation she announces her engagement to his father, a gay young widower. Carver decides that the only way to end the match is to disgrace the family so the girl won't dare to marry into it. He tries various sorts of disgraceful work even to accepting a job as bus boy in a restaurant, only to find that instead of being thought less of, the newspapers make great capital of his example to the pampered and lazy workman. Of course everything comes out all right after a series of typically Washburn situations replete with humor.

DRIERS CARE FOR FRUIT

During the inactivity of some of the canneries of the state, many of the driers are being used to help care for this year's large loganberry crop. Large driers of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association at Sheridan and Scotts Mills are running and many of the smaller driers are being used in caring for the berries. In this way all of the crop can be saved and it is expected that the driers will be a big factor in solving the problem this year.

OREGON MAN TO DO RELIEF WORK IN THE NEAR EAST

J. J. Handsaker, State Director Near East Relief, sailed from New York, June 30, on the steamship, "Acropolis," for the Near East where he will engage in relief work in various districts during the summer, returning to Portland in the fall.

"Resolutions endorsing the work of the Near East Relief and calling upon all members to support it in its great humanitarian service have been passed by the Brotherhood of American Yoenmen in their sixth quadrennial convocation," writes Mr. Handsaker from Washington, D. C. "The resolutions are specifically in relation to the work done by the Near East Relief for the care and training of orphan children, in which work the Near East Relief are assured of the hearty support and cooperation of all members of the brotherhood."

Mr. Handsaker was present at the meeting of the National Agricultural Advisory committee where resolutions were passed and says, "I think I never saw a group more interested and more eager to do everything possible than these men." The chairman, Senator Arthur Capper, in his endorsement of the resolutions stated in part, "Among our allies in the World War, none suffered more seriously than did the Armenian people. Their battle losses were greater in proportion to the population and their losses by massacre, starvation and deportation are beyond human description. Ninety per cent of the Armenian people are agriculturists. They are thrifty and self-supporting people. The Near East Relief, in addition to its refugee problem, is caring for more than a hundred thousand orphans and a hundred and fifty thousand people are cared for every month in the hospitals and clinics. The farm organizations of the United States are cooperating with the Near East Relief in meeting the needs of these suffering people. The farmers of America have contributed hundreds of thousands of bushels of corn and many thousand dollars of other supplies such as cotton, rice and beans. America is the only hope of saving this ancient agrarian race from absolute extinction. Surely their cry of need will not fall upon deaf ears."

Actual experience in relief work began for Mr. Handsaker with the sailing of his ship. He writes from the steamer, "I think my first story will be about an Armenian mother and four children in the steerage. One child is a cripple because the Turks broke his leg. Although the Armenians in New York tried to get them landed, governmental red tape could not be unbound and they must go back on the 'Acropolis' as they came out on her. Their friends agreed to put up bonds that the child would not become a charge on the community and could be sent to school, still they had to go back. It makes me think of how grandmother Handsaker brought her ten children over from England to America in 1821."
