AT THE BAKER THEATRE DURING THE COMING WEEK

The mysticism and romance of South Africa, its diamond mines and the witchcraft still practiced by some of the natives form the background of "Sins of Rosanne," starring Ethel Clayton, which will be shown at the Baker Theatre on Friday and Saturday nights of this week. Rosanne, the heroine of this story, has received from a native woman the gifts of loving bright stones and of inflicting hardships upon those whom she dislikes. She satisfies her love for diamonds by acting as a go-between in a diamond smuggling scheme. Her desire for the jewels is even stronger than her love for the man of her heart, she lets him go. But later, the true Rosanne asserts herself.

It's dangerous business to say you're married when you're not. At least it was for Constance Talmadge in "Dangerous Business" which will be shown at the Baker on Monday and Tuesday nights of next week. A perfect reproduction of the novel in story, characterization and setting, it carries to the screen the well known Harry Leon Wilson humor, unique and unexcelled. Joseph J.
