OBITUARY

The following obituary was re-
 ceived just too late for our last issue
 and is published this week instead.

W. C. Jackson, son of John G. and
 Rosa Jackson, was born in Marion,
 Indiana, December 21, 1896. He
 came to Salem, Oregon, with his par-
 ents in 1908 and most of his school
 life was spent in Salem. He enlisted
 in the army at Salem, July 15, 1916,
 and served here and overseas where
 he met his death at the battle of
 Chateau Thierry, France, in the
 world war for the betterment of
 mankind. He was a dutiful son and
 splendid soldier and will be sadly
 missed in the home circles and by
 his many friends. He was laid to
 rest in the family lot in Cityview
 cemetery, Salem, Sunday afternoon,
 July 30. Funeral services were held
 from the Rigdon undertaking par-
 lors with brother Lee of the High-
 lands Friends church officiating.
 The American Legion had charge of
 services at the grave.

 Rosa Jackson of Newberg, one brother,
