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GEORGIA MAN GIVES NEWBERG LAVISH PRAISE

Gentlemen: If you will pardon this attempt to express my feelings toward your lovely, up-to-date little city and some of her citizens, I will be glad to make the effort.

I have just been reading in two copies of The Graphic, which my grandfather, one of Newberg's citizens, has sent to me, about the "Berian Festival." (Perhaps you know Aug. Wentz.) I am very much interested in this Festival, for I was in your fair city quite a while in the early part of 1920, and was very favorably impressed with both Newberg and Chehalis Valley. I believe it is called. Especially that part between Rex and Newberg with its orchards and poultry farms and dairies. They all look fine as seen from the "Red Electric" cars or from your fine highways, but a close view shows them up even better.

If I received such an impression in mid-winter, what must Oregon be like when nature is at her best? There is enough farmer about me to make me appreciate what a wonderful asset the black soil of Yamhill and adjoining counties must be, as here in Georgia we have always thought it necessary to use commercial fertilizers, until recently, when crops that build up land have been planted, such as velvet beans, cow peas, etc.

I have been sorry many times that I did not remain in your city or vicinity, and am not so sure that I may not return.

Your climate is wonderful. My friends here are inclined not to believe you can have such mild winters in such a northern latitude.

In my two months visit in Portland, Rex and Newberg, I do not remember a day that was as cold as we quite often have in south Georgia, two hundred miles south of Atlanta.

To my mind, Oregon has some of the most ideal—and I've been as far east as Paris and west to San Francisco, north to Canada and south to the Gulf. Oregonians are justly proud of the Willamette Valley.

If part of this should get by the waste basket, I should like to add a word of appreciation to the Odd Fellows, W. R. C. and the old veterans of the G. A. R., and others, for the welcome I received while in Newberg. I was lucky enough to be at two W. R. C. dinners.

Newberg and Oregon has a booster in Georgia, let me say, for I've talked about Oregon and its fruit and crops until my friends all want to "come and see."

OIL PROSPECTORS MAY DRILL IN MARION

Salem, Or., Aug. 16—A move is on foot to prospect for oil in the northern part of Marion county west of St. Paul and West Woodburn, and Pennsylvania promoters have signed up a large acreage of land, though not the full 7000 acres they desired to obtain before starting a well. It is believed a well will be started, nevertheless.

The proposed well will be on the farm of F. Brasel for twenty-nine years a farmer on the Champoog road, three miles west of West Woodburn.

The signed acreage, approximately 2000, follows: F. Brasel, 51 acres; McClure of Pendleton, 63 acres; E. Wehrum, 150 acres; the Hardings, over 1000 acres; Otto Bittler, 68 acres; William Forester, 65 acres, and others.—Woodburn Independent.
