THE HIGH SCHOOL AGRICULTURAL NOTES

(Oliver F. Kilham)

"Any class of farmer has an advantage over his fellow countrymen. One can at least live off the land. If necessity requires, he can live almost entirely off the produce of his own farm. The farm furnishes him with an equivalent of rent, and, in timber sections, with fuel. It furnishes him with milk and butter, eggs and poultry, all the vegetables that he really needs, and a large portion if not all, of his meat. The farmer's clothing is not nearly so expensive as that required by many other classes.

"The farmer can within a year arrange his farming so that it can be conducted with the minimum of labor. Much of his produce can be held from one year to another, and at the minimum of expense. On the other hand, the manufacturer must run his factory at a low profit and sometimes at a partial loss for the time being, rather than stand the losses incident to closing down and disorganizing his working force. Rents go on with the merchant whether he sells little or much and whether he makes or loses.

"When the factory closes down the laborer is out of a job. The farm will furnish the farmer with a job all the year around, and where the cost of living is the cheapest. A depression in prices, a change in the tariff, some new discovery, may wipe out the business of the manufacturer or merchant, but the farm remains. Prices will fall and have often fallen as low as the cost of production, and for a short time even below that. But this is after all only temporary and can be provided against by greater economy of production."

"Should the farm boy remain upon the farm? Upon general principles, I say, yes, and emphatically, yes. There are exceptions, but generally speaking, I would advise the farmer's boy to remain on the farm unless he can give legitimate, sensible, and positive reasons for a change. He is of the nobility of the soil—a nobility not of many dollars, but descended from the parent of dollars. The country boy, born and reared upon the farm, should give the farm the preference. Let him consider it thoroughly and intelligently and without prejudice. The farmer's boy should realize that success is not so much how much one earns in a year as how much one gets out of a year, in experience, money, and opportunity to enjoy life."

OLD PRUNES ARE SOLD

Cleaning up the entire stock of 1920 prunes in its western warehouses, the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association sold three quarters of a million pounds of prunes during the last week of sales at an advance of a half cent a pound over regular quoted prices.

Nearly a million pounds of prunes of the old crop are still in the association's hands in eastern warehouses, however. It is expected that these stocks will be completely cleaned by the middle of October.

New additions to the membership of the association in the last week have brought in an additional 60,000 pounds of prunes which will be sold in separate pools.

The Oregon Growers Association has marketed 12,084,488 pounds of prunes of the 1920 crop.

FIRST PEARS SHIPPED

The first shipment of pears went from the Salem warehouse of the Oregon Growers association on the 20th of August. The pear season is starting nearly 10 days earlier than it did last year.

The pears are larger than usual and are of good quality. There is much scab on the fruit due to the heavy infection during the late spring rains but the pears are running strongly to the No. 1 grade in spite of this fact.
