MORE M'MINNVILLE MUD

It is peculiar to say the least that the McMinnville papers are apparently always looking for some opportunity to get a "dig" at Newberg. Following their recent carnival one of the county seat papers had the following to say:

"Of course the delegation from Newberg was not large, but perhaps it was an index of community cooperation as exemplified by our neighboring town."

This is a most unjust and unfair statement on the part of the McMinnville paper. Newberg turned out to the Legion carnival at that place in much better numbers than did the McMinnville people to the Newberg Berry Festival last summer and the Lester Rees Post from Newberg had a pretty float in the parade at McMinnville, according to the account of this same paper. We didn't see any float from McMinnville at the Berry Festival.

There has been altogether too much feeling between the county seat and Newberg and such insinuations on the part of the McMinnville papers will not tend to heal the breach. As a matter of fact this carnival came at a very bad time for our people when prune drying and picking was on hand and many could not possibly get away. In addition to this, with the Dayton celebration coming just before it and the state fair just after it both of which demanded the attendance of our people it was hard to get away for this carnival which came on after both of the others had been planned.

The McMinnville paper should remember also that there were many Newberg people there with whom they were not familiar and that while no organization representing this place, other than the Legion, was present, yet there were many individuals from here at McMinnville. The Graphic could have found just as good grounds for picking flaws with our southern neighbor at the time of the Berry Festival, but in fairness to them, we did not take advantage of the opportunity. However, it seems that the McMinnville paper, in its broad-minded attitude toward county cooperation, did not view the subject in that way. Possibly it won't be long before they are advocating calling this McMinnville county.

There are a number of outstanding examples of the belief held by many people that peace is not necessarily maintained by a show of great military strength. Take the splendid example of the United

States and Canada or that similar one of Chile and Argentine. Where is there less evidence of desire for strife than between these nations, yet these feelings and conditions would never have existed had either of these countries persisted in maintaining a great show of military strength along their borders. A man going round with his fists doubled up, is always subject to suspicion and just so a nation with an immense army and navy is always looked upon with misgivings. There is a much better way to spend money for war prevention and that is in the education of the nations along lines of peace and in the belief that other nations don't want war. Let's spend more money on missionaries and education and less for armament.

Another month has gone and still nothing definite has been done towards making the road from the payment on Wynoski street to the bridge passable during the winter months. We are already borrowing time from winter and unless we get action at once it will be too late. The Graphic has no other interest than a community interest in this project but we should like to see this road fixed up so that St. Paul people could continue to come this way to trade.

PRUNES ARE UNUSUALLY LARGE

Grading and packing of the new crop of prunes has begun in the packing plants of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association and the first day's run indicated that the highest expectations for large sized prunes are being surpassed. Practically no small prunes can be found in the Willamette valley this season. More than 50 tons of prunes have already been graded at the Salem plant and nearly all of them are of the largest sizes. More than 75 per cent were 30-40s, 18 per cent were 40-50s and three per cent were 50-60s. Some of the prunes are in the 20-30 grade. It is probable that there will be difficulty in meeting the demand for small sized prunes.

The very light crop all over the Willamette valley is responsible for the large size of the prunes and very favorable weather during the ripening season put a great deal of sugar into them, making them of very fine quality. In the Umpqua valley the trees were more heavily loaded and there will be a greater proportion of small sizes in that district.

The prunes are being packed and shipped immediately. Shipments will be made as fast as possible in order to get early returns from buyers which will permit of early returns to the grower.

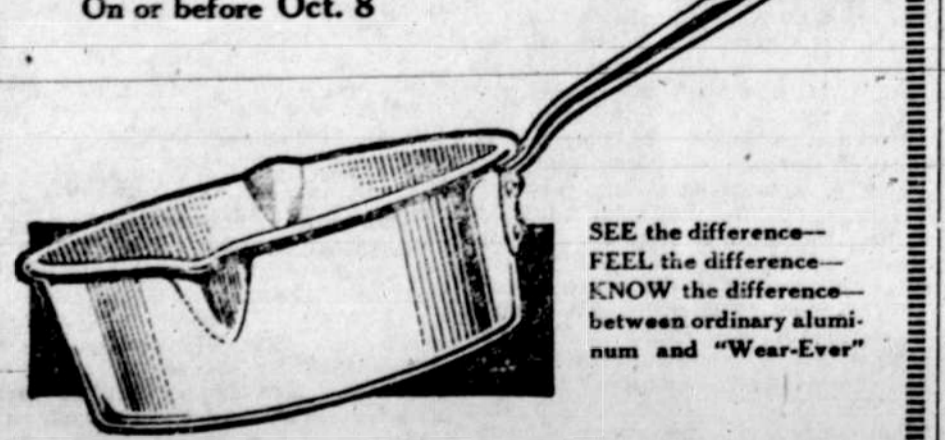
