FARM POINTERS

When lime is to be used it is best applied in the fall after plowing and while the ground is dry enough for it to be harrowed in. It will then be most evenly distributed through the soil. Its best use this fall will be as a starter for clover where clover will not grow because of acidity, or for intensive crops, on account of the cost.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

Cleaning up the garden and field crop remnants, weeds and other litter, will help materially in checking the numerous insects and diseases that are gathering this fall to attack the next crops. Fall plowing, leaving the fallow ground in the rough, and burning or otherwise clearing up the borders of the tracts, destroy immense numbers of pests and leaves the earth in good condition for early working next spring.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

It's bad for the soil to leave the land that bore late crops, such as corn and potatoes, bare over winter. It will fare better sown in winter grain or in cover crops such as vetch, which is particularly good for garden soils. It helps put the soil in good physical condition as well as enrich it with humus and nitrogen. Soils thus treated can be worked earlier in the spring and with less labor, as they are mellow and hold moisture better.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

Big profits from crop rotation are shown in a six-year test with beans at the O. A. C. Experiment station. Land that grew beans continuously without irrigation or manure, averaged a net profit of \$13.59 per acre for the six years. Rotated with other crops the beans averaged a net profit of \$20.43, a gain of \$6.84 per acre.

FINDS CURE FOR "FLU"

London—A new prevention for influenza has been discovered by Dr. J. A. Taylor, a prominent English medico. Describing the result of his experiment in the British Medical Journal, Doctor Taylor says ordinary tincture iodine is mixed with honey and placed on the tongue every two or three hours or oftener.
