As we look back over the past year, we can all certainly find things over which we may rejoice. Doubtless for most of us it has been a blessed year, full of good things and finds us one milestone higher up the ladder than did last year.

Here in this special community we have special reasons for offering thanks to Omnipotence for special providential kindnesses. Our crops were large for the most part and while the prices were not so high as they have been, they were sufficient for the most part to pay something more than their cost. Costs of living on the other hand have come down somewhat and today it is easier to get along than it was a short time ago. Here in our community want and suffering are certainly reduced to the minimum and we do not have any great unemployment problem. Here we have freedom; we enjoy good schools; we have for the most part good roads; good churches, good lodges, good weather, and in fact everything for which one expects. With the territory to the north swathed in a mantle of snow and cold and with floods to the south and west, we here in this section have much to be thankful for in our location and present immunity from these things.

As a nation we can be thankful for war's cessation and for the steps taken to insure future peace and the scrapping of war materials. The bow of promise of many future years of peace certainly spans the eastern

sky and there is great cause for rejoicing in the thought that men's minds are receptive toward the ideas of peace.

Let us not forget those who are less favorably situated and let us above all not forget Him who from His bounty gives us the good things of life, but let us make today a day of real Thanksgiving.

LET'S GO

Under the caption "Small Town Stuff" the Haffsburg Bulletin says: Harrisburg was represented at the meeting of the secretaries of the various chambers of commerce held in Portland. In a way it was a distinction. No town as small as Harrisburg was represented. The lesson was learned by the local secretary, that no town grows too big to rid itself of knotty problems to solve, many of which are identical to small town troubles, only intensely magnified.

There is no doubt that much good is obtained from the gathering together of the secretaries of these organizations for the purpose of comparing conditions, learning what the other fellow is doing and planning for a larger achievement. Too often we look upon these matters as of too little importance and do not see that our city is included in such gatherings. The wide-awake people of Newberg—those who wish to see our city recognized at her full value by the state at large—should see that no opportunity is allowed to pass to have this place included in a statewide gathering of any kind.

When the committees were made up for the 1925 exposition in Portland recently, several smaller towns were given representation on these committees, but Newberg was overlooked. We are not inclined to blame the exposition people for this, for at a meeting held previous to this time and which was open to anyone to attend, no one from Newberg saw fit to go. Newberg cannot expect recognition from the state at large unless Newberg people cooperate with the state in boosting the various organizations of a statewide nature which bring all of the communities together for mutual good.

In other words we cannot hope to ignore our obligations and then expect recognition at other times. Some months ago we made a distinct impression upon the rest of the state by the beautiful float which we entered in the Rose Festival parade. Since that time we have been to a

large extent content to recount our honors in connection with this event and allow many other opportunities for community betterment and community advancement to slip by us. Let us wake up and see that Newberg is in everything and that she is recognized by everyone as a live wide-awake community. It is up to our Commercial club, our Berrian organization, our Farmers club, our Women's clubs, and any organization which exists here to see that these things are done.

Forgers Use New Method

An original touch in forgery is reported by the Paris correspondent of the London Daily Mail. Making forged notes dirty in order that they might look like real is said to have been the method adopted by four men who have just been arrested at Limoges on a charge of counterfeiting the small brown one-franc notes (nominally 10d.) which are in circulation in Paris owing to the shortage of silver ones.

After printing off bundles of notes of a face value of 7000 English pounds, the men it is stated, buried them in the ground for a fortnight. The notes then had a crumpled and dirty appearance as if they had been a long time in use, and were readily accepted. In some cases the forged notes were accepted in bundles of 50 at local banks.
