Velvet Table Runner

A length of velvet in a desirable shade may be made into a very pretty table runner with a brocaded border. Cut out the desired portion of a heavy lace, dip in water and wring out, lay it face down on the velvet, just as you wish the border, cover with a dry cloth and press with a hot iron. Heavenly Jam

Take basket of dark grapes and four large sweet oranges, one pound best seedless raisins and four pounds sugar. Wash oranges and squeeze juice out; take bitter pulp out and grind skins in small grinder; put grapes on stove after removing skins and let pulp warm. Run through sieve to remove seeds. Add skin and oranges and raisins. Put all in large granite pan and add sugar. Let simmer over fire for 20 minutes until syrup is formed. This makes a gallon of jam and is put in a crock.—B.
