WOOL ASSOCIATION PASSES
EIGHTEEN HUNDRED MARK

The membership of the Oregon wool and mohair growers cooperative association passed the eighteen hundred member mark during the week of November 13-21. At a meeting of the board of directors held during the stock show it was decided to expand the association into neighboring states and to change the name to Pacific cooperative wool growers. The membership now includes growers from Washington and California, who have joined voluntarily, as no organization campaign has yet been put on in those states.

The association has had a very successful season, moving several hundred thousand pounds of wool at good prices, and operating at a very low overhead expense. Members are well pleased with results as prices are better than they could have received by marketing in an ungraded condition at country points.

The association handled about 2,000,000 pounds of product this season, but this is only a small part of the 50,000,000 pounds of wool which was marketed cooperatively in the United States this year. One association has over 11,000 members, while the Canadian association, a five year old organization, numbers over 12,000 wool growers. In no instance would these growers return to the old haphazard system of selling wool to peddlers and country buyers in an ungraded condition. The various associations' methods of grading wools, properly preparing for market and direct mill selling, mean more profits for the wool grower than under the old methods.

Wool is one product which sells best in large concentrated quantities, especially when graded. This is one reason why the state and regional associations have proven so successful during the past three years. Cooperative marketing of wool is an economic practice which gains many benefits for the wool growers, and supplies in the best possible condition. It is orderly marketing of the highest type and orderly marketing has been one of the very real needs of American agriculture.

Carrie L. Dunning, the originator of the improved system of music study, after returning from several years of study with Fraulein, Prentner and Leschetizky, the renowned Vienna instructors, continued teaching advanced pupils until, impressed by their lack of a general knowledge of the fundamental principles of music, she began to look about for a better method of instructing beginners and younger pupils. The improved system of music study for beginners, as perfected by Mrs. Dunning, is the result of much research, together with practical, personal experience—is indeed, an evolution. The author, from her experience as a teacher, has eliminated, elaborated, and perfected, until she claims to have a most complete and finished system. She has long felt that a simple, entertaining, as well as instructive method, might be used in the early education of the child; that the rudiments of music should be made more attractive, at the same time developing the musical side of the child's nature, so that, as the pupils advance, they become intelligent musicians, instead of mere players of an instrument. The value of intelligent, or sympathetic musical interpretation is apparent and the author firmly believes that in this system she has given to the students of music a lasting benefit.

How many have a natural or cultivated rhythm? Yet the lack is wholly due to the early training and instruction. Among the many who play, how few are actually musical! In this system of music study special attention is given to the development of those features which we find the majority of music pupils naturally have not. Having thoroughly investigated and studied other methods and means in use, having proved the practicability of the system with large classes of pupils, the originator feels that she has perfected an improved system of music study for beginners that will be an inspiration and a delight to teachers and children.

That the progress of the pupils is a revelation to parents and musicians was shown at the first demonstration of the work covered in eight months. So great was the admiration expressed that advanced educators and friends prevailed to have this programme rendered at the music teachers' conventions.

The period of the first few lessons in music is a crisis in a child's life. And when we think of the difficulties beginners have in their first lesson at the piano, which are the results of forcing more ideas upon the child's mind than it can grasp, we cannot wonder that there is confusion and discouragement by having so many things to remember at once. It is no wonder that the little ones find it irksome, and feel that the lessons are too much like work.

Music, to fulfill its mission should be a joy from the beginning. It is found that the improved system of music study for beginners presents each difficulty in turn in such an easy and instructive manner that the child of four or five can grasp and comprehend its difficulties with but little mental effort, and can, at the age of ten, attain a certain degree of proficiency.

Throughout the whole course the serious work of the young student is ever prominent, yet the drills and exercises used to fix the facts presented are more of the nature of a series of games than of arduous labor. This eliminates the tedious drudgery of the rudiments of music by presenting each topic in a manner that appeals to the child's sense of pleasure, while at the same time they are constantly acquiring information and developing qualities which would be impossible under the old way of instruction. Who cannot remember how inexpressively tiresome were the first principles of music, as taught in the old way, and

children have ever puzzled over terminology they could not understand? The value of notes meant nothing more or less to them than a mathematical problem. In their struggle with sharps and flats, added lines, measure signs, rests, sixteenth and thirty-second notes, crescendos and diminuendos, everything seemed a chaos of technical mysteries under which the beauties of the art were hidden, the child lost interest before the delights of music were unfolded.

Many teachers have long felt the need of some reformation along the line of elementary teaching, and these will hail with delight the advent of the Dunning system, and can appreciate the superiority of its methods and apparatus for presenting music by the ease and pleasure with which children grasp the most abstruse sense.

The impressions made upon the child's mind between the ages of five and twelve are the most lasting and their tender natures are most susceptible to the slightest influences. That a year's unsympathetic teaching at this time may be an injury which time cannot obliterate has been proven again and again. Therefore, it is better to employ means which will inspire and not discourage; will interest, not weary; means by which beginners will become intelligent, wise little musicians from the start and love that art which has no peer—music.

TESTED COWS MAKE MONEY
FOR PROGRESSIVE OWNER

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Nov. 28.—Oregon cow-testing association dairymen made a clear profit of \$2664 additional gain by following association methods in October, 1921. This shows splendid progress, reports E. B. Fitts, federal and O. A. C. extension dairy specialist.

The average yield of milk reported for the 2500 cows in cow-testing associations was 571 pounds, and the yield of butter fat 27.91 pounds. This was an average of 2.29 pounds of fat over the yield for October '20. The total gain was 5920 pounds of fat, which at 45 cents a pound was worth \$2664—a clear gain. This gain was made over much better than average production, being the yield of well tested cows last year. Compared with the average yield of untested cows the showing is much more impressive.

The Tillamook association led in the number of cows tested, 1040, and number of honor cows giving more than 40 pounds of fat.

The Rogue River association made the highest average production, 34.46 pounds of fat.

Twelve grade Jerseys owned by Clyde Kinneson of the Tillamook association made the highest herd average, 50.73 pounds. A. J. Rogers' Holstein, Princess, gave the most fat for the month, 84.85 pounds. Thirteen low producers were weeded out.

Good feeding and management as well as good cows are objectives of the association.
