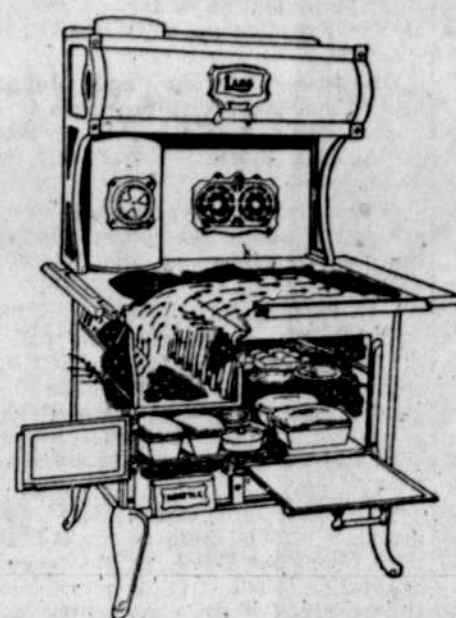

Seeing Without Eyes

That the blind can perceive light and darkness is asserted by Dr. A. Cantonnet in Medicine (Paris). Doctor Cantonnet tested eyeless seeing machinery by bandaging his eyes light-proof and concentrating his attention for 50 hours on perception of light. He found that he could then perceive not merely light and darkness but also large and shining objects.

Testing many blind persons he found the same ability. He attributes this vision without eyes to Ranvier's sensory cells, which have a nerve sensation with the brain centers.
