HAS THE LONGEST DIARY

An article in the American Friend may be of interest to some of our readers as it tells of a half brother of Jesse Edwards of Newberg. The article in part is as follows: Henry Ballinger, now residing at Couer d'Alene, Idaho, claims to have kept a diary for a longer time than any other man in the world. Beginning September 18, 1854, when he was profoundly impressed by God's miraculous prevention of his death in an accident, he kept a record for sixty-four years, never missing a day. He well remembers an incident in connection with Martin Van Buren, a candidate for the presidency of the United States, which occurred when he was four years old, and he believes he has seen the presidents farther back than almost anyone else in the United States. He can run up a ladder and over a roof like a boy, can climb a fifty foot pine and top it, and can walk ten or fifteen miles a day, and does walk four to eight miles every day. He has not reclined on a bed or couch to rest or nap in daytime for seventeen years. He eats no meat and uses buttermilk almost entirely as a drink. He was converted when eleven years old and attributes his health and activity to God's direct mercy and his own temperate life in all things from his youth up. He never uses tobacco or liquor in any form and has never been sick in bed a day.

OLDER CONCERNS STILL HOLD BUYERS' CONFIDENCE

During the war, many factories and businesses were organized that were given a foothold by the lack of supplies for our military and inflated industrial needs.
