BRIEF DIGEST OF MOTOR

VEHICLE ACT JUST PASSED

Providing for the supervision and regulation of the transportation of persons and property for compensation over any public highway by motor vehicles.

The new automotive legislation is interpreted as affecting all corporations, persons or companies owning, controlling, operating or managing any motor vehicle used in the business of transportation of persons or property for compensation over the public highways of the state, exception being made to such vehicles as operate exclusively within the limits of an incorporated city or town.

The public service commission, in its administration of the act, is authorized to supervise and regulate such features as rates, services and facilities from the standpoint of their reasonableness, safety and adequacy and to exercise jurisdiction in such matters affecting the relationship of such companies with the passenger and shipping public.

All companies or individuals subject to the act and engaged in the operation of this class of public transportation must first obtain from the commission a certificate or permit setting forth the terms and conditions covering such operations, also to file a surety bond or liability insurance and good faith undertaking.

The maximum license fee is fixed at ten dollars per vehicle.

The necessary application blanks, including a request for pertinent data, accompanied by copies of the law, are furnished by the public service commission promptly upon request. The county clerks and county judges of the various counties have been supplied with copies of the new law for the information of the general public.

The commission requests the cooperation of the automotive industry and the general public in the introduction of and compliance with the new law in matter and spirit.
