SHORT COURSE FOR COMMERCIAL CLUB SECRETARIES

University of Oregon, Eugene, January 7.—A short course for the commercial club secretaries of the state will be offered by the University during Easter vacation from March 27 to April 1, according to an announcement by the school of business administration. The course was given for the first time last year and met with such success that the visiting secretaries passed resolutions requesting the University to make it an annual affair.

Besides classes in public speaking, commerce, journalism, sociology and physical education, there will be a number of round table discussions on topics of particular interest and value to secretaries.

About fifteen secretaries of various active commercial clubs and chambers of commerce in the state, were enrolled last year and it is expected a much larger number will take advantage of the course this March.

BUS LINE SEEKS PERMIT

Salem, Jan. 11.—The Portland-Newberg stage company, with headquarters in Portland, today filed application with the Oregon public service for a permit to operate six cars under the new highway transportation act approved at the recent special session of the legislature. This is the first corporation to make application under the new law.

Enclosed with the application was \$60, or \$10 for each machine operated by the company. The amount of the bonds to be demanded from companies operating automobile stage lines in Oregon has not yet been fixed but probably will be announced within the next few days. F. NEWBERG STUDENTS ON HONOR LIST AT UNIVERSITY

The University of Oregon grade bulletin, affectionately termed by many students "the scandal sheet," indicates that the women lead the men by a narrow margin in scholarship in the university for the fall term. With a total of approximately 1060 men and 940 women registered for the term, a total of 33 women and 31 men received no grade lower than II, next to the highest possible mark.

Of the 64 who received an all-II or higher mark, 49 are undergraduates and 15 are in the graduate school. The percentage of all-II cards in the graduate school is nearly 25, since the total enrollment in graduate work is 64. Of the graduates with II average, 28 are women and 21 men, while of the graduates ranking high, 10 are men and five women.

Upper Classes Better

University students' grades, as shown in the report, tend to rise steadily, from class to class, with the freshmen having the fewest of all-II cards and the seniors and graduate students the most. Only two first-year men and one first-year woman received no mark lower than II for the term. The first-year man who made this rating was Irwin Scott Adams of Milwaukie and John B. Rogers of Baker, both freshmen in the school of business administration. The freshman girl who did not fall below II is Marian P. Taylor of Silverton, a major in botany.

Conditions are ripe for greatly increased drainage activity in Oregon with improved labor conditions and the probability of the extension of federal reclamation work to drainage, says W. L. Powers, chief of soils at the O. A. C. experiment station.

Picking out the good cows in cow testing association work brought up average production 104 pounds of milk and 2.46 pounds butter fat for all Oregon association cows in November over that of same month a year earlier. 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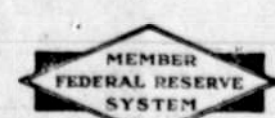
