## NEWBERG HIGH SCHOOL AGRICULTURE NOTES

(Oliver F. Kilham)  
While attending the farm bureau meeting on Monday, the 9th, we noted quite a natural curiosity as to the personnel of the men who were trying to put the farm bureau idea over.

All seemed to know quite well who President Mansfield was, but some questions were asked as to the nativity and vocation of Colonel Aird, at the present time secretary of the Oregon farm bureau federation.

Colonel Aird is, as we understand it, a native Oregonian, whose home is in Clackamas county. According to the Portland papers he served with distinction overseas during the world war, and is at the present time in addition to his work as secretary of the farm bureau, engaged in farming.

Some will wonder how he can farm and at the same time perform the duties expected of him by the farm bureau organization. Our answer to that would perhaps be "by using his head." That will not appear to be such a queer answer when we add that Colonel Aird makes a specialty of paddy seed production.

Some time ago we noted an article in which we believed it was the Market Grover's Journal, published in Louisville, Kentucky, telling about his seed production work near Oregon City.

If we remember correctly, the land used consisted of only two acres. We recalled the article when we met Colonel Aird, and asked him if he were the man we had in mind. He replied that he was, and during our conversation, he made the statement that he had a total yield last season of eighty (80) pounds of seed.

We hear someone say, "My what a small amount!" Certainly it wasn't very large, but when we tell you that this special strain of paddy seed is selling readily for \$6.00 per ounce you will find, by figuring a little, that one may, if he knows how, make about as much from two acres as he can from sixty, or even one hundred and sixty.

It is interesting is it not, to find a bona fide farmer who is able to see an opportunity of this kind and take advantage of it? And is it not true that such a type of man is probably just the sort of a man to help the average farmer to a considerable extent.

From observation and hearsay, we have become convinced that one of the greatest drawbacks to the average Oregon farmer has been too great diversification. Diversification for home consumption is right. But greater specialization for wholesale production with a view to shipping to eastern and perhaps foreign markets is necessary. Let us have even more specialization, but let us not do this to such an extent as to deprive our own families of the many things that the home farm can be made to produce.

Cooperation counts for little without specialization.

Specialization, plus cooperation, equals—Success!

It has occurred to us that some of the young people may not have succeeded in getting the idea we tried to give in our last article, wherefore we publish the following:

There are to be found in this world three main classes of vocations:

1. Those requiring exceptional mathematical ability.
2. Those requiring exceptional language ability.
3. Those requiring excellent (but not necessarily exceptional) mathematical and language ability.

Do you come under class one? If so, then you will do well to consider the possibilities along engineering lines. Or, you could probably make a fair success as a farmer or merchant (so-called business man). You could undoubtedly make good if you would rather easily, in any line that did not necessitate your dealing directly and intimately with the general public. The following pre-vocational subjects should supposedly interest you above all others:

College English composition.  
College algebra.  
Trigonometry.  
Analytical geometry.  
Calculus (differential and integral).  
Mechanical drawing.  
College physics (including laboratory).  
Principles of economics.  
Freehand lettering.  
Graphic statistics.

Do you come under class two? If so, then you will do well to consider some vocation of which journalism is rather typical. You could probably make a fair success as a farmer or merchant. Anything that partakes of the nature of art rather than science should give you a good chance for self-expression.

The following pre-vocational subjects should be particularly suited to your needs:

Economic history.  
Principles of economics.  
Elements of sociology.  
College English composition.  
Theme writing.  
Short story writing.  
Oregon history.  
American literature (early and recent).

Contemporary English novelists.  
Contemporary poetry.  
Elementary psychology.

Do you come under class three? If so, then you will in the nature of things look into vocations of which the law is perhaps typical. The selling line, or medicine, or almost any business line (including farming) should offer you an excellent opportunity for success. You are fortunate, for you are the man who can probably succeed at anything. The following pre-vocational subjects should supposedly interest you in the main:

College English composition.  
History (English and American).  
Mathematics college algebra, trigonometry, calculus, one or more of these.  
Economic history.  
Principles of economics.  
College physics.

Regulations of the United States veterans' bureau, limiting the time for reinstatement of war risk insurance for ex-service men have been amended so that the men who have allowed their policies to lapse may reinstate them at any time before March 4, 1926.

## WILLAMETTE VALLEY PETITES ALL SOLD

Renewed activity in the prune market entirely cleaned up all of the Oregon Growers association Petite prunes in the Willamette valley. A large tonnage of the association's holdings of Petites in the Umpqua valley went at the same time.

Higher prices on California prunes have created a demand for Oregon stock and several cars were sold during the last week, a part of them going to foreign buyers.

There has been a tendency on the part of eastern buyers to discredit information coming from the coast that holdings of prunes at the present time are very light. However, they are beginning to realize that a shortage actually exists and the market is showing signs of a rapid awakening.

There have been very light crops of most drying fruits in nearly all sections of the west and the pack of canned fruit during the last season is also short. These conditions are expected to work toward the early clean up of stocks of dried and canned fruit and it is thought that they will be largely sold out by the middle of the coming summer.
