CHILDREN'S FARM HOME IS BEING ESTABLISHED

A children's farm home, a real home as distinguished from an institution, where orphaned and dependent children can be cared for in Christian surroundings, is fast becoming a reality. This farm home for both boys and girls will be located three miles from Corvallis. The site has already been determined and the first payment is now being made. The maintenance for the first year is assured.

All citizens, interested in the care of homeless and dependent children, are asked to aid in making this ideal home possible. The home is under the auspices of the Oregon Woman's Christian Temperance Union, but it has the support of the entire citizenship of the state. The officers and board of trustees consist of public-spirited men and women with no selfish interests to be served. They are giving their time and money to the project with no compensation of any sort.

Mrs. Lottie Hannon of this city, county chairman of the W. C. T. U., is in charge of the local campaign for the farm home. Liberal gifts have been made, which have been used in the preliminary work, but funds are now needed for payments on the farm and for the construction of the cottages, where the children will be housed. It is hoped that some of the buildings will be ready by summer.

Appeal to Circuit Court

The case of A. A. Timmons against the Southern Pacific company has been appealed by the railroad company. In the justice of the peace court, Timmons was allowed \$150 judgment, for inconvenience and trouble he sustained in having been put off a Southern Pacific train at Gaston. Timmons had called for a ticket to McMinnville from the agent at Hillsboro who inadvertently gave him a ticket to Cornelius. B. A. Kilks represented Timmons in the trial before the justice of the peace. Ben Dey was the attorney for the railroad company.

Bull Charges on Automobile

Joseph A. Linville, through his attorneys, Vinton & Toole, has started an action in the circuit court against Sam Burdett, alleging that his automobile was damaged by an uncontrolled bull on March 27, at 7 o'clock in the evening on the McMinnville-Carlton highway. It is alleged that the defendant unlawfully permitted the male bovine to be outside of an enclosure. The bull is said to have charged on the automobile while Dr. Linville was passing the Burdett farm and damaged the hood of the car, radiator, lights, etc.
