NEWBERG HIGH SCHOOL AGRICULTURE NOTES

(Oliver F. Kilham)

A farmers' institute or chautauqua is a splendid thing. The one being held in our city at the present time is most welcome. It is an educational institution and should be encouraged in every way, by everybody.

Much general information and not a few specific things of value will be taken away from the chautauqua meetings. However, when it comes to the actual managing of the farm, the actual doing of the work, the putting into practice of the things gleaned as pointers or hints from whatever source or sources, every farmer should have close at hand good reference material.

Some time ago, it may have been last year, or the year before, we recommended most highly in an article in the Newberg Graphic, the Farm and Garden Rule Book, compiled by Dr. L. H. Bailey, sometime dean of the college of agriculture, Cornell university, published by MacMillan & Company.

To date we know of a few farmers who have either already bought this book or have determined to do so. But we know there are any number of others who should have it. We assure you we are not trying to dodge work, but we want to see every last farmer independently well posted to the greatest extent possible.

It is fortunate that we have one book of small size and reasonable price available as a practically complete reference book for the farmer. We say "practically complete" purposely, for every book you or I lay our hands on almost, might be more comprehensive for us as individuals.

For the benefit of those interested, we outline the twenty-nine chapters of the Farm and Garden Rule Book as follows:

1. The weather.
2. The elements and the soil.
3. Chemical fertilizers, and lime.
4. Farm manures, and similar materials.
5. Seed tables.
6. Planting tables.
7. Maturities, yields and multiplication.
8. Crops for special farm practices; home storage and keeping of crops.
9. Commercial grades of crop products; fruit packages.
10. The judging of farms, crops and plants; exhibition and nomenclature rules; emblematic plants and flowers.
11. Greenhouse and window garden work.
12. Forestry and timber.
13. Weeds.
14. Pests and nuisances.
15. Fungicides and germicides for plant diseases.
16. Plant diseases.
17. Insecticidal materials and practices.
18. Injurious insects, with treatment.
19. Livestock rules and records.
20. Poultry.
21. Exhibiting and judging livestock; market grades.
22. Computing the ration for farm animals.
23. External parasites of animals.
24. Milk and milk products; dairy farms.
25. Construction, farm engineering, mechanics.
26. Mason work; cements, paints, glues and waxes.
27. Computation tables.
28. Collecting and preserving specimens for cabinets or exhibition; perfumery; labels.
29. Directories.

We trust this formidable looking outline will not frighten anyone away from the book, for as a matter of fact, it is of the following dimensions, by actual measurement: Seven inches long, five inches wide, and one and one-half inches thick.

As stated in a previous article, speaking as one experienced farmer to another, if we were to start out to manage a farm tomorrow, and could have but one book, no other, we would ask for the Farm and Garden Rule Book. It is invaluable to the experienced farmer. It would be of no earthly use to the inexperienced.

And if that is not strong enough as a recommendation, read this: We have the very great privilege of being an honorary member of the Newberg Farmers' club. As a member of the Newberg Farmers' club, we again most earnestly urge that every local farmer who has the price, get himself a copy of this splendid book for reference purposes.

With this book at hand and used, you can lay claim to being a scientific farmer. Without it, or reference material that covers practically the same ground, you cannot.
