A wave of rationalism we are told is sweeping over our land. It seems strange that anything so discredited as this relic of defunct Germanism should be taken in to poison our country's morale as it did Germany's. Rationalism is only another name for pride, self-will, stubbornness, self-conceit and self-righteousness, the qualities that caused the angels to fall, and that bring about human depravity and conflicts. Rationalism of the godless variety is a fake pure and simple, because pretending to exercise human reason upon questions the material for which is not before us. Rationalism is pure guessing, blind guessing, silly guessing, unscientific and sinful. It is not inductive but deductive, and indicates stupid arrogance. The real scientific spirit is humble and prayerful and believing; and there are more real scholars and scientists in spirit among the humble students of divine things, who never advertise their attainments or boast of their scholarship, than among the proud ranks of materialists and rationalists. Let us see where rationalism lands a man—in rejection of Christ, in boasts of being the superman, in hatred and war and cruelty, and as we are good Americans and good Christians, spurn such blind big-headedness. Loss of honor and the power of regarding a treaty as a scrap of paper, and brutal trampling upon others, are the fruits of rationalism in school or university.
