Wife of Daniel Webster

Grace Fletcher was the daughter of a minister, and lived in Hopkinton, where Daniel Webster met her soon after he settled in Portsmouth. His engagement was rather a surprise to Webster's friends, because, not long before he became engaged, he had written to one of his relatives:

"I am making no progress toward matrimony. In point of time, I am 23 years nearer to it than when I was born, but, in point of probability I cannot say that I am any."

It was in 1807 that Webster had met and proposed to Miss Fletcher. History has it that he saw his future wife for the first time in church. She was visiting a sister in Salisbury at the same time that he was there. At any rate, they did not know each other very long before they were married.

At the time of their marriage Mrs. Webster was 27 years old, one year her husband's senior. She proved an ideal wife for this famous American statesman. She had the character and education which enabled her not only to appreciate, but also to share in her husband's political successes. Her dignity, composure and refinement made it easy for her to exercise her duties as the wife of so great a man of affairs. She was not only considered a model wife, but also a perfect mother for their one child, a girl, who was named for her mother. Without losing her poise, she could be merry and animated, and always made everyone feel perfectly at home.

In his biography of Webster, Mr. Curtis quotes Mr. Tickner as saying: "Mrs. Webster was pleasing and animated, and her manner to the friends of her husband, and to us young men, was very kind and cordial."

For 20 years they lived happily together in peace and harmony, with no domestic trouble to mar the public career of one of America's greatest patriots.
