WHY A BAND?

In view of the fact that the Berrians are giving a minstrel show next week to provide money for our local band, doubtless the question of why Newberg needs to support a band may come up in the minds of some persons. Most people realize the benefits of such a musical organization, but there are some who think that money spent for such purposes is wasted. Many of these people like to hear a good band and when there is a celebration or a special event, they think that a band adds to the occasion, but they do not stop to think that in order to have a band for special occasions we must keep it up at all times; have it trained, furnish music, uniforms, etc.

The Berrians have been paying out about \$10 a week to keep the local band going. Some of this has gone to pay the salary of a director. Some has gone for railroad expenses and hotel accommodations for the director. Some has gone for the rent of a hall in which to hold their practices and some has gone for new music.

When the berry festival was held last year the band was an important part of the celebration. When we went to Dayton the band played the important part of our participation. When we went to Portland during the Rose Festival we took the band. There are always calls for the band's services and no live town can afford to be without one.

We have a mighty good band, too. The boys can play some very good music and they have shown their appreciation of the work of the Berrians in their behalf, by a willingness to help the Berrians at all times. The Berrians appreciate this spirit on their part and want to help them still more. The thing which the band needs most of all at present is some new uniforms. When we go to Portland and Salem and other places with our band we do not want them to be handicapped by a tacky

appearance and consequently this effort is being made to get them some new uniforms which will make them appear to better advantage.

If you believe in our band, or if you believe in our Berrians, support this movement by buying tickets and attending the minstrel show. You will see a good show and incidentally help along a good cause. The Berrians are going to make a supreme effort to win the first prize at Portland this summer. They will have much keener competition than last year and will need a great deal of assistance from the local people. A well uniformed band will play no small part in making a favorable impression. Let's all remember that this is Newberg's band—our band if you please.

BUSINESS CONDITIONS

We have at hand the monthly report of John Perrin, federal reserve agent of the San Francisco Federal Reserve bank, for the month of February and find some interesting facts outlined. The report states that "prices for most of the principal farm products of this district have risen materially since the first of the year. Since a large part of last year's crops is already out of the farmers' hands the recent rise in prices will not operate primarily to increase returns to producers. It is significant however, in its bearing upon returns to be received from crops now in the ground." The report goes on to say "The lumber industry of the district continued to improve during January, increases being registered in production, shipments and orders received. The cut of the largest lumber association of the district for the week ending February 11 (134 mills reporting) was only 11 per cent below normal."

"Employment conditions during January were practically unchanged as compared with December with much unemployment in mining centers, in metal trades, at the ship yards and among unskilled labor. Real improvement is expected with the resumption of farm work and other out-door labor in the spring."

"Retail trade as reflected in reports from 33 department stores in the leading cities of the district continues to exceed in volume that of a year ago. The improvement in the wholesale trade which began to be apparent in October, 1921, continues."

"Building activity in the district has again reached record proportions, exceeding by \$13,000,000 or 155 per cent, the value of operations reported for January, 1921. Of the twenty

cities reporting, 14 advise a larger number of permits issued during January, 1922, than during January, 1921."

"Business failures during January, 1922, following the national trend, were larger in number than for any month within recent years."

A WRONG RUMOR

It is rumored that Newberg is very much interested in this community not getting a high school. We hope this is not true. Newberg is waxing fat off of the taxpayers of this community for high school tuitions and naturally she doesn't want to see a fine revenue cut off. But we protest any interference."—Sherwood News.

Like many "rumors" this one is wrong, Brother Hewitt. The people of Newberg hope that you will be successful in building your high school. We are facing a housing problem of our own and can use the room which would be vacated in the event of your being able to care for your own students to mighty good advantage. And not only that, but we want to see you prosper and go ahead. There might be some one in this community who would not agree with this, but we believe that you will find the majority of our people wishing you success.

REAL COOPERATION

The merchants of Newberg have been showing a splendid spirit of cooperation with several of the local organizations of late by boosting for their many benefit affairs through their advertising. Lines telling the public to join the Legion, to attend the Whitney boys concert, the minstrel show and other affairs, have been run in the ads and have helped greatly to increase the interest in these various affairs. Such cooperation on the part of the merchants should be appreciated by the buying public and they should not be slow to reciprocate.

In a letter to a California friend, Rev. Carter sets a good example to Oregonians to boost for Oregon. Too often the impression is given out that California has a wonderfully superior climate and country, but such occurrences as the frost of the past winter and the earthquakes which occur with considerable frequency should not be overlooked in considering the two states. Oregon, as Rev. Carter says, may have her cold rains, but she doesn't have destructive earthquakes and at the present time who could ask for bet-

ter weather conditions than we are having.
