IS THERE ANY FIRE?

Practically every one of the orators at the state intercollegiate contest last Friday night gave utterance to some national warning. Taken singly, one might form the impression that the speaker was inclined to look on the dark side of things and pass the warning by as unimportant. Taken as a whole, and considering the fact that here we had gathered some of the best students of our higher educational institutions from all parts of the state, we cannot help but feel that the old adage "Where there is so much smoke there must be some fire" is applicable.

Nor does one have to confine his thought to the utterances of these orators to realize the impending fate of the nation if we continue in the course which we as a people are following at the present time. But as we have taken the subject up from the viewpoint of the orators let us follow their train of thought at least to some extent. The first speaker of the evening took up the question of law enforcement. He showed how contempt for one law was breeding contempt for all law and appealed for a respect for and obedience to the laws of our country. He cited the fact that many of our best young men had been willing to sacrifice their very lives for their country's protection from without and had returned home and taken part in a pernicious propaganda and attack upon the constitution of our country from within, which may prove equally disastrous if not stopped. It was a warning most timely and appropriate.

Another speaker handled the loose morals of the country, emphasizing the divorce evils and the tearing down of those sacred home ties which are the very foundation stone of the nation. Many of the speakers pointed to the fall of ancient Rome and other mighty nations as examples of what we might expect if we continue in lawlessness and immorality.

America's opportunity to christianize China and make of her hundreds of millions of people a peace loving people instead of a warlike power which might eventually swallow us up and prove a much worse foe than Germany proved herself to be in the last great war, was the basis of another oration. This orator gave warning of the dire possibilities which may befall us if we do not accept this responsibility and push forward the work of christianizing those heathen peoples before they are influenced by others in an evil way.

The young lady orator took for her theme the individual, and showed that all responsibilities rest upon the individuals who compose the nation. It is easy to deal with generalities and say that the country must do this and the nation must do that, but bringing it home to the individual, it is more difficult to say you must do so and you must not do so. Yet after all it is only as the individuals of our country, the great masses which make up the country, come to realize the importance of these things and accept their personal obligations and responsibilities that we shall have any hope of accomplishing anything. It is utterly useless to pass laws unless the people themselves will respect these laws. It is folly to try to do something as a nation unless the people of the nation awaken to their own part in the rise or fall of the thing to be accomplished. What could America have done in the prosecution of the late war, had not her people realized the consequences to themselves of defeat and thrown themselves and their all into the common cause?

Other warnings were sounded by speakers who showed threatening conditions in regard to industrial strife and future war possibilities. But after all do not all of these come back to that same proposition of the education of the individual to his or her part in the ultimate accomplishment. Can we ever have the loyalty to our laws unless we as individuals refuse to treat as jests and subjects for jest, the various laws of our country? Can we ever have national morality, until we rise up and demand it and then proceed to back those demands up by living the highest type of moral lives ourselves? Can we hope to see China become a christian nation and her mighty forces removed from the danger column to the column of friendship unless we as individuals are willing to set right examples and make person-

al sacrifices for her sake and for her christianization? Can we have lasting peace unless we are sufficiently courageous within ourselves to demand the obliteration of national defense and armies and navies, being willing to trust in a protection greater than these things, the protection of mutual love and trust instilled in the hearts of mankind by the Divine Providence? Can we have satisfactory industrial conditions throughout the nation, unless we are willing to do away with selfishness and refuse to buy goods manufactured under sweatshop conditions because they are cheaper, and unless we are willing to make industrial conditions better in our own business establishments? The answer to all these questions is "No." We must start at home, with ourselves, in all of these things. Our nation is indeed in great danger, but it will do no good to pass national legislation or act as a nation unless we as individuals are willing to back our nation up and make these personal sacrifices ourselves. Will the American people follow the example of ancient Rome, or will they demonstrate that they have a deeper moral and spiritual foundation? We have a great faith in the American people and we believe they will rise above the present tendency towards loose morals, law defiance, unwillingness to accept responsibility, carelessness of national affairs, etc., and will assert themselves as the greatest nation of all time. We can lead the world if we do. We shall be swept into oblivion if we don't. The warnings are well sounded. There is too much fire beneath the cloud of smoke.

Newberg demonstrated her good sportsmanship again this week by playing Tillamook when she had already won the district championship in reality without doing so at all. Doubtless Tillamook will have less to holler about anyhow.

Newberg certainly needs a community building. Will you do your part to help get one? We told the boys that we appreciated their work for us "over there." Let's prove it by backing them up in their work over here.

It was no dishonor not to be among the first three winners at the state oratorical contest this year, for there were a number who might well have been considered excellent who failed to place.

It's good news to the farmers and fruit growers that the local cannery and the one at Springbrook will both run on a larger scale this year.

Let it rain; we'll have all the sunshine we want next summer.

SCIENCE AIMING BLOW AT DEATH

Famous English Surgeon Predicts
Perpetual Life and Brain
Grafting.

NEW DISCOVERIES BY CARREL

Whole Kidney Successfully Grafted
From One Animal Into Another
of Same Species—Arteries
Transplanted.

London.—"Not only may the brains of the illustrious be grafted on the living, but we may also be on the eve of the secret of perpetual life."

This astounding possibility, arising out of a story told in the Daily Express of Prof. Alexis Carrel's discovery, is revealed by Sir William Arbuthnot Lane, the famous surgeon, who worked with Professor Carrel before the war.

"Any tissue kept on a microscopic slide, at a suitable temperature, fed with the right material, and drained at frequent intervals, will grow and live forever," said Sir William.

"If this is applied not only to one or two tissues, but to all the tissues of a living body, then it follows that such a man would live forever."

Food Too Digestible.

"We pay for civilization by eating digestible food. We should in reality eat indigestible food as the savage does. The Hindu lives on corn ground between stones and the cake he makes is most imperfectly roasted. Therefore, he avoids all disease of the intestine, such as cancer, which is spreading in the civilized world with the most alarming rapidity."

"Professor Carrel has made astounding discoveries. He successfully grafted a whole kidney from one animal into another of the same species. He did the same with a leg and other members, transplanting arteries and veins at the same time. I have seen a black dog with a white leg that had been grafted on. The blood vessels joined up during the operation and worked successfully. Professor Carrel tried grafting a kidney on the organism of a living man, but it became calcareous. These experiments, however, are invaluable because they lead the way."

Overrun the Slides.

"The tissues Professor Carrel is experimenting with are mounted on slides and have to be kept at the same temperature as that of the human body. They are washed every day with saline water to dispose of by-products and they will never die as long as the treatment is continued. They grow just like a fungus, and in time overrun the slide. There is no such thing as death as long as there is perfect drainage."

"Professor Carrel has not yet been able to unite tissues and keep them growing. Until this can be done these fragments will have no thought, although they may possess feeling."

"This work gives doctors and scientists a great insight on what is going on in the human body. Small tissues of the brain, the liver, or the heart may all be treated in this way. If the fragments are fed with thyroid juice they will digest the food and, provided all by-products are washed away, their life is absolutely without limit."

RUSS PRINCESS IS STOWAWAY

Native American Who Wed in Europe
Flees When Reds Kill Her
Husband.

New Orleans, La.—Princess Tschernitscheo, a native American and identified with Russian royalty under the Romanoff regime, is in New Orleans, having arrived as a stowaway and stewardess on the steamship Texandrier, which docked here from Antwerp.

The princess is being detained at the Algiers immigration station while government authorities are investigating. An examination will be held to determine whether she shall be allowed to remain in this country without proper passports.

In 1909 she is said to have married Prince Ivan Tschernitscheo. Her husband, it was said, recently was put to death by Bolsheviks.

The princess is said to have walked most of the way across Russia and Europe to Antwerp, where she boarded the Texandrier.

Fish Deep in Oil Well.
Bakersfield, Cal.—A wildcat oil well on the Hitchcock ranch south of Porterville, at 1,200 feet, has begun to produce—not oil, but fish, according to word received here. They were tiny specimens, apparently from a subterranean stream.

Man Paid Dog Fee, but Refused Wife's Poll Tax
