Household Hints

Dried soup vegetables, which may be purchased in air-tight packages, need only to be soaked over night before being added to the soup stock.

Their use saves time in preparation, and loss from unsound vegetables, at the same time providing a greater variety than is generally used.

Wash white silk gloves in cold water and dry in shade. They will not turn yellow.

If the cup in which molasses is measured is greased with a little butter or lard every bit of molasses will come out.

A glass washboard, although it breaks more easily, is to be preferred to a metal one, because the corrugations are rounded and the friction on the clothes is less.

However, if a metal washboard is used, it should be thoroughly dry before being put away, so that it will not warp or attract waterbugs.

The Oregon Supreme Court has held that the Dog License is legal, and the County Court is going to enforce the law.

You will have until the first of April in which to pay your license, then if it is not paid you will be subject to arrest, and fine of not less than \$10 and costs. Now don't delay this matter and get caught, but send your license money to the County Clerk at once. \$1.00 for male or spayed female and \$2.00 for female. Mention size of collar desired when sending for license.
