**NEWBERG HIGH SCHOOL AGRICULTURE NOTES**  
(Oliver F. Kilham)  
Mention was made in a recent issue of the Graphic of the flower growing to get material for decorating the Berrian float.  
It would seem to us that such a matter can be handled only by giving much time and forethought to it. We doubt very much if it will be satisfactory, year after year, to depend upon local people for material to be grown by them in their yards. Perhaps we may get a plentiful supply of roses that way, but if we are to have something new and original each year, the Berrian organization will need, it appears to us, to locate a good plot of ground some place in town and set out systematically, to have on hand each year, a plentiful (extremely generous) supply of the color materials that will probably be needed.  
It will not work out in practice, to decide upon a float design the previous fall or winter, and then set out to get folks to grow the flowers to carry out the said design. Except in a few instances, with our variable spring openings, it will not be possible to use annual flowering plants material, unless—unless we have a professional plantsman to sow seed and transplant at the right time each year. That can be done if necessary, of course.  
Our idea would be to use herbaceous perennial and flowering shrub blooms for decorating. In the herbaceous perennial class for instance, such plants as are supposed to flower the middle of June or perhaps earlier, viz:  
Perennial cornflower, Sweet William, goat's rue, cranesbill, alum root or coral bell, mallow, gas plant, alkanet, columbine, Carpathian harebell, harkspur, foxglove, lupine, scabious, dropwort, etc.  
Such flowering shrubs might be grown as Chinese quince, spirea Vanhoutter, lilacs of various kinds, flowering plums, dentzia gracilis, Tartarian honeysuckles, corchorus, single flowering Japanese snowball, dentzia Pride of Rochester, weigella, syringa or mock orange, etc.  
The foregoing list, be it understood, is mere illustrations, and has been compiled somewhat hurriedly, based on blooming period only.  
It will be found perhaps that some flowers listed would not stand up at all well for float decorating work. And again, it will be found that many wild flowers may be found and used to take the place of some listed.  
What we do wish to drive home to all is the idea that a thing of this kind must be worked out with painstaking care, with the thought in mind of having plenty of good colors on hand every year to carry out any scheme adopted.  
If perennial material is grown by the organization in a garden set aside for that purpose, and perhaps supplemented by some annuals as needed by a professional under contract, we will always be prepared; everybody will be happy, and each and every year—we can put a cracker-jack float in the Portland Rose Festival parade with a minimum of effort and a maximum of satisfaction to all concerned.
