All of the second grade broccoli is to be canned by the Oregon Growers' cooperative association, which will probably net the grower considerably more than by selling on the open market.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK INSTALLS CHEMICAL ALARM

There has been installed in the bank the new electrical and poison gas device known as the Chemical Alarm. It combines the electric protection used by the big city banks and in addition is guaranteed to render helpless the toughest "yegg" that ever cracked a safe.

When a hole is drilled, explosives applied or the new steel conqueror the acetylene cutter used, a big electric gong will awaken the citizens of Newberg, who would like nothing better than to take a pot shot at a bank burglar.

The Electrical World has estimated that one billion dollars (\$1,000,000,000) a year for the next five years will be needed to develop the electric light and power business of the country and care for conditions brought about by the world war.

At the close of 1921 there were 10,375,200 customers of electric utilities in the United States. There was an increase of 1,001,700 consumers during 1921 in the country.

On January 1, 1922, there were 14,467 cities and communities served by electric companies in the United States.

The actual investments in these companies is \$4,600,000,000.

The output of these companies in 1921 totaled 43,100,000,000 kilowatt hours, or more than 57 billion horsepower.

There are 1,800,000 people who are stockholders in these utilities.

There are 250,000 employees.

Ninety-seven per cent of all energy generated is developed by private companies.

WILL INVESTIGATE MANCHURIAN WALNUT COMPETITION

Senator Charles L. McNary has informed the Oregon Growers cooperative association that the senate subcommittee has adopted his resolution providing for an appropriation with which to investigate the Manchurian walnut industry. This will allow an expert to be detailed to Manchuria to obtain data on the whole industry of that country.

The problem of the importation of the Manchurian walnut is becoming critical. Nearly 7,000,000 pounds of Manchurian walnuts were imported to San Francisco during December and January, with an average valuation of 8 1/2 cents per pound.

Senator McNary has been cooperating with the Oregon Growers to reduce the walnut importation which is a serious menace to our home industry.

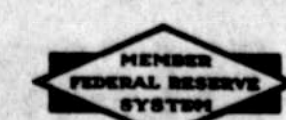
